Espanola Hosts First Day Of Mourning Led By Domtar Unions



By Rosalind Russell - Over 100 workers and supporters took a few minutes of time out of their day on Friday to attend Espanola's first-ever Day of Mourning. On the way into the main offices of Domtar, there is a rock structure featuring a plaque, which many people simply walk pass on their way to work. However, it is a special boulder recognizing workers who have either died on the job or passed away due to work-related illnesses.

Domtar Human Resources Manager Teresa J. Miller told those in attendance April 28th, the National Day of Mourning, is not only a day to remember and honour lives lost or injured at work, but also a day to renew the commitment to improve health and safety in the workplace.

Labour Union Unifor Local 74 president, Joanne Lamothe then read out

Carol Hughes' Column No Time To Be Soft On Softwood As Tariffs Threaten Canadian Jobs

Donald Trump was elected by talking tough on trade issues, but Canada did not appear to be his primary concern. Mexico and China were seen as the biggest irritants for the United States in terms of trade imbalance and Canadians were mostly holding their breath and hoping for the We knew that America wanted to rework the North American Free Trade Agreement, but didn't expect the President to take aim at Canada ahead of those negotiations. All that changed this week when America levelled new tariffs on Canadian softwood.

Our softwood lumber sector has been on the defensive for decades. Successive governments have failed to break the impasse with America and this has cost Canada thousands of jobs while sounding the death knell for many communities. In this latest version of the dispute, the U.S. will apply punitive countervailing duties of up to 24% on Canadian softwood lumber. The shock of that will ripple throughout the entirety of industries that utilize softwood such as construction or pulp and paper which still has a strong presence in Algoma-Manitoulin-Kapuskasing.

Right now, the Canadian lumber industry employs over 200,000 people across the country. During the last softwood dispute, about 400 sawmills closed and Canada lost more than 20,000 jobs. This disproportionately hurt rural communities and that is why it is so important for the government to act swiftly and decisively to mute the worst effects of this trade dispute. We know from experience that job losses can gut a town's population which makes it difficult to find employees when the pendulum swings back and the jobs return. This played

out in White River over the last decade.

At the heart of the dispute is the way that prices are set for logging, known as stumpage fees. In the past these disagreements have been settled by the World Trade Organization (WTO) but, another round in court is not a solution that has any permanence. The last agreement on softwood was negotiated by Stephen Harper's government in 2006. It was seen as a retreat from a stronger position – even by the Liberals who voted against it. Democrats are reminding the government of that position and telling them the time is right to stand up for Canadian jobs and fair trade.

While it's clear that another agreement will have to be negotiated to offer long-term protection for softwood jobs, it's also clear that now is the time to protect the companies that will be affected in the interim. That's why it's worrisome that the Liberals have ignored calls from Ontario and Quebec for federal loan guarantees that would help ensure companies aren't bankrupted by U.S. duties, which trade tribunals like the WTO have consistently found to be unjustified.

Meanwhile, communities that depend on softwood jobs are very worried. There is a desperate need for immediate action as part of a concrete short-term plan that will deal with this emerging crisis. If this dispute follows the same pattern as past versions, there will ultimately be a settlement that doesn't move the needle as far towards the U.S. as their tariffs do now. For Canada, preserving jobs will require a commitment from the government. Right now, it remains to be seen if that will be coming.

Recipe

These easy, oven baked taquitos make a great appetizer or meal. Taquitos are basically rolled up tacos.
Use rotisserie chicken for this recipe to keep it fast



and simple. To keep things on the healthier side, they are baked in the oven. Spraying them with non-stick cooking spray makes them get nice and crispy in the oven. When the taquitos are done baking, top them with all the toppings and serve them with salsa for dipping.

Baked Chicken Taquitos

For the taquitos:

- 2 cups shredded chicken (we use rotisserie chicken)
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1/2 teaspoon ground chili powder
- 1/2 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/4 teaspoon paprika
- 2 teaspoons fresh lime juice
- 1 cup shredded cheddar or Mexican blend cheese
- 20 corn tortillas
- Non-stick cooking spray

Topping Suggestions

- · Shredded lettuce
- Diced tomatoes
- Guacamole
- Sour Cream
- Chopped Green Onion
- Salsa



Preheat the oven to 425 degrees F. Spray a large baking sheet with non-stick cooking spray and set aside. In a medium bowl, combine the shredded chicken with the cumin, chili powder, salt, garlic powder, paprika, and fresh lime juice. Stir until chicken is well coated with the seasonings. Stir in the shredded cheese. Get two paper towels damp and place two tortillas at a time in between the paper towels. Place in the microwave for 20-30 seconds. Remove from the microwave and roll up the taquitos. Place a heaping tablespoon of the chicken and cheese mixture in the center of the tortilla and roll it up tightly. Place the taquito, seam side down on the prepared baking sheet. Continue rolling taquitos until the tortillas and filling are gone. You should have about 20 taquitos. Spray the taquitos generously with non-stick cooking spray. Bake for 15-20 minutes or until taquitos are golden brown and crispy. Remove from the oven and serve warm with desired toppings.

Former Espanola Resident Pleads Guilty To Sexual Assault

Dale 'Klutzy' Rancourt could face federal sentence: The Crown is seeking a federal sentence after Dale 'Klutzy' Rancourt pleads guilty to sexual assault

Dale Rancourt, 51, originally hails from Espanola, but moved out east to expand his clown business. Known for his character Klutzy the Klown, he arrived in Sydney provincial court Tuesday morning, April 25th, saying he was "terribly remorseful," according to the Cape Breton Post.

He was previously denied bail.

In an agreed statement of facts read by Crown Shane Russell, it was stated that Rancourt became involved with a 15-year-old girl in July 2016 and had sexual intercourse with her on multiple occasions.

He was initially charged with two counts of sexual interference involving a person under the age of 16 and single counts of sexual assault and sexual exploitation.

The offence occurred in various

locations in the Cape Breton Regional Municipality between July 15 and Oct. 16.

Rancourt also pleaded guilty to breaching a court order by being in an area frequented by teens.

The breach offences occurred in Sydney between Nov. 3-10 and relate to him dropping off donations to a community agency where the victim was involved.


He was also charged with four counts of breaching his release conditions — two counts of failing to keep the peace and be of good behaviour and two counts of attending places where persons under the age of 18 are likely to be present.

Initially, he was facing nine charges.

Before the plea deal, he was expected to stand trial on all charges beginning this week.

Crown lawyers Peter Harrison and Russell said they will now be requesting a federal sentence for Rancourt.

Mcoleman Court Case Finished – Judge Decision Date Set For May 12Th

Paul McColeman's lawyer says the Crown failed to prove his client is connected to the social media accounts that allegedly lured Espanola boys to perform sex acts.

Darren Berlinguette also said Tuesday the testimony of the alleged victims against McColeman was filled with inconsistencies.

At the start of the trial, McColeman, 45, was facing 36 charges including communication for the purpose of child prostitution, luring children, sexual exploitation and indecent exposure involving an alleged 17 male minors from 2006 to late June 2014 in Espanola. The Crown stayed two of those charges on Monday.

The Crown alleges McColeman set up several personas or identities -- Jennifer Johnstone/Jen Pooh and Treber Boucher on Facebook and Hyperchick on MSN Messenger -- to contact teenage boys in Espanola and offer them favours such as drugs, alcohol or cash for participating in sexual acts with him or strangers. The sexual acts were referred to as "missions" or "dares" in the messages the teens received,

according to the Crown.

On the stand, McColeman denied having sexual relations with teen males over the eight-year period, and said he had never even heard of or met some of them.

Assistant Crown attorney Philip Zylberberg used IP address data of log-ins on the Treber Boucher and Paul McColeman Facebook accounts over a one-month period in the spring of 2014. That information showed that on numerous occasions, the IP address randomly assigned to the device accessing one of the accounts was the same one that accessed the other within a short time frame.

Zylberberg said that meant that either the same device was still on the Internet and had not logged out over the time periods, or, by pure co-incidence, the same IP address just happened to be re-assigned to another user in all of the instances. The trial started March 13 and went 23 days. The Crown called more than a dozen witnesses while Berlinguette called nine, including McColeman.

Superior Court Justice Patricia Hennessy has reserved her decision. A decision date will be set May 12.
