International Artist And First Nation Advocate, Christi Belcourt, Named To Espanola Wall Of Fame

By Rosalind Russell - Espanola artist, Christi Belcourt, has been chosen as this year's inductee of the Espanola Wall of Fame, the town's highest civic award.

Espanola Mayor Ron Piche made the official announcement last week stating she has dedicated not only her artwork for social changes and justice for Indigenous People, but her life as well.

Belcourt is a recipient of the 2016 Governor-General's Innovation Award, which recognizes individuals, teams and/or organizations whose innovations are truly



### International Artist And First Nation Advocate, Christi Belcourt, Named To Espanola Wall Of Fame

exceptional, transformative, and positive in their impact on quality of life in Canada, explains Piche. The public is invited to the inductee ceremony and reception, which will take place Thursday, December 7, 2017 from 6:30-8:30 pm at the Espanola Legion.

Piche added he and council are proud Belcourt calls Espanola home and are humbled to be given an opportunity to honour her with this celebration. Christi Belcourt is a Métis visual artist and author who calls Espanola home.

She is best known world-wide for her acrylic paintings which depict floral patterns inspired by Métis and First Nations historical beadwork art.

Belcourt is also recognized within the Métis community as one of the preeminent Métis artists in Canada. Belcourt's work often focuses on questions around identity, culture, place and

divisions within communities.

She is the daughter of national Métis rights activist Tonv Belcourt and Judith Pierce-Martin (née Streatch). Her family's roots are connected to Manitou Saskhigan (also known as Lac Ste. Anne), Alberta. Her brother Shane Belcourt is a writer, director, musician and cinematographer known for his feature film Tkaronto, which depicts the life of urban Métis and First Nations people. Her sister Suzanne Belcourt is a graphic designer and artist living and working in southern Ontario. In 1970, her father was elected as the founding President of the Native Council of Canada (now known as the Congress of Aboriginal Peoples) and the family relocated permanently Ontario Ottawa, from Edmonton, Alberta.

As a Métis visual artist with a deep respect for the traditions and knowledge of her people, the majority of her work explores and celebrates the beauty of the natural world.

She is also the author of three books: Medicines To Help Us (study prints & book, based on painting of same title; Saskatoon: Gabriel Dumont Institute, 2007), Jeremy and the Magic Ball (the Ontario Federation of Indian Friendship Centres) and Beadwork (Ningwakwe Learning Press).

Her artistic work has been commissioned by the Gabriel Dumont Institute (Saskatoon, 2004), the Nature Conservancy of Canada and the Centre for Traditional Knowledge Museum of Nature (Ottawa, 2002), and is found in the permanent collections of the National Gallery of Canada, the Thunder Bay Art Gallery and the Canadian Museum of Civilization, First People's Hall. Belcourt is a past recipient of awards from the Canada Council for the Arts, the Ontario Arts Council and the Métis Nation of Ontario.

Belcourt has also been studying traditional plants (identification of, stories of, medicinal uses for, names in Michif and Cree) for numerous years.

Belcourt is the project creator and lead coordinator of the Walking With Our Sisters, a crowd-sourced commemorative art installation for the missing and murdered Indigenous women of Canada and the United States. Started in 2012 this project has toured throughout communities in North American and continues to be driven by community volunteers.

In 2014, Belcourt founded

the community based The Onaman Collective with Isaac Murdoch and Erin Konsmo. This project aims to preserve traditional knowledge, language, and teachings. In recent years Belcourt has become a vocal advocate for the need for a Métis land base and the power of Indigenous language restoration. The Onaman Collective has also worked to connect traditional knowledge keepers and elders with Indigenous youth. The Collective has also engaged advocacy around water protection and raising awareness of the need to protect the Great Lakes and other bodies of water. In the same year, Belcourt was also involved in promoting the "blue dot" movement as a way of visually protesting government decisions around the First Nations Control of First Nations Education Act. The blue dots added to photographs in this movement were used as a way of identifying the marginalized people left out of the conversations by the Canadian Government.

In 2015, her art took an unusual twist. Valentino designers were inspired by Belcourt's Water Song painting for its 2016 Resort line. Painstaking effort was made to match colours and shapes exactly from one of her paintings hanging in the National Gallery, Water Song. The work is then printed and embroidered onto outfits, which vary from shorts and halter tops to full length dresses. Her other consideration before saying ves to the collaboration, was the environmental record of the House of Valentino.


The event is geared to open the season and get into ski mode.

### Highs And Lows Of Development In Sables-Spanish Rivers



A new business investment association could be in the works for downtown areas of the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers.

The township's Focus Group met with the public in mid-October to bounce around ideas for the local Strategic Plan on Economic Development.

Township EDO Kelli Hansson says there was a lot of positive feedback: the Township excels at including parks and recreation programming; the low tax rate and municipal services; contributions from the Mennonites and revitalization of the agricultural sector.

Hansson adds some of the issues include youth outmigration; rising costs for local business; lack of services geared

towards keeping seniors in the community; reliable and affordable broadband in the rural areas and greater social media presence.

"Some opportunities for improvement include the appearance and revitalization of "downtown areas" through the establishment of a Business Investment Association. more regional partnerships with neighbours, particularly Sagamok First Nation, as well as exploring opportunities to create more events and festivals."

The focus groups are initial discussions about the shape of the updated Strategic Plan.

Hansson adds the township values residents input, and collecting information from these focus group feedback sessions is a necessary step in developing an updated plan, which will serve as a guide to future economic development.

The final and official Strategic Plan update will be a result of much more research and discussion over the coming months with Council, based in part on these preliminary focus groups.

Hansson says the next focus group session will be held in November.

### Robinson-Huron Treaty Litigation Hearing Continues



Member First Nations of the Robinson-Huron Treaty hope to convince the courts that the treaty has to be dealt with under today's terms and monetary status.

Hearings into the interpretation of the Robinson-Huron Treaty and its \$4 annuity payments are now underway.

First Nations of the Robinson-Huron Treaty area filed the lawsuit against the governments of Canada and Ontario for failing to adhere to the terms of the 1850 treaty.

At the heart of the lawsuit is annuity payments, which First Nation leaders in the treaty area say have not been honoured.

The treaty promised an initial payment of \$2 per individual, which would be increased based on the wealth generated by the

land and resources.

The last increase was in 1874, doubled to \$4.

Hearings have been held in Thunder Bay and Little Current on Manitoulin Island.

The hearings returned to Garden River last week where Chief Dean Sayers and Elders will give more evidence on the clan systems and governance relationships of the Anish leading up to treaty making.

Espanola and the North Shore are in Robinson-Huron Treaty territory.

It is not known how long it will take for the court to resolve the matter. Review of the documentation, witnesses testimony and historical record is expected to take some time. Photo: Map of the Robison-

### NOJHL Showcase Raises Over \$5,000 For Mental Health

Helping the public as well as players, coaches and staff to cope with mental illness is a serious part of the Northern Ontario Junior Hockey League mandate. The league puts a spotlight on mental health during the tournament.

Those in attendance were able to learn more about the importance of mental wellness and the local services that are available should an individual or their families be suffering.

Nearly 500 players, coaches, parents and staff have received safeTALK training over the last two years, an accredited training program that teaches individuals how to recognize persons with thoughts of suicide and to connect them with supports in their community.

The Espanola Express also played in the showcase and is an avid supporter of the program.

### **Support Continues For Fire Victims**



An Espanola homeowner and his son have lost everything to a residential fire the afternoon of Wednesday, October 18th.

The Espanola Firefighters were joined by the Baldwin Township counterparts on the scene of a trailer fire.

Espanola Police say the call came in about ten minutes after

The home, Unit 16, Lee Valley Road in the Espanola Mobile Trailer Park was totally gutted. Espanola Fire Chief Mike Pichor says the fire is still under investigation and the cause is still unknown.

Pichor adds there is extensive damage to the exterior by the main entrance, the roof and the kitchen area.

Also, the floor has water damage.

The owner was not insured. Tim Roberts and his son, Alex Roberts-Piche escaped the fire, but only managed to save a few pieces of clothes.

A go fund me account has been set up by family members to help the two recover from their loss.

The loss of the home and contents is estimated at around \$40,000.

Coin jars have also been set up at Stewart's Store in Webbwood and the UPI gas station in Espanola.

This is the sixth fire in Espanola since July, but there is no connection between them, with the exception of the Queensway Motel.

The motel had to be closed in July due to a fire in the living quarters.

A second fire broke out at the motel in late summer, but Chief Pichor says the Ontario Fire Marshall office is still investigating that incident.

### Recipe

vegetarian daughter recommended this recipe to me. Quick, easy, flavourful, and made with 100% real ingredients, this version of Creamy Tomato and Spinach Pasta uses just a touch of cream cheese and Parmesan to



make a regular tomato sauce rich and creamy. If you're not into cream cheese, you can also add a splash (1/4 cup or so) of half and half to achieve a similar effect. Sliced mushrooms would also be a great addition; just cook the mushrooms along with the onions and garlic. You can always do a plain creamy tomato sauce without the vegetables. The options are endless.

#### Creamy Tomato and Spinach Pasta

Serves: 4

- 1/2 lb penne pasta
- 1 small onion
- 2 cloves garlic
- 1 Tbsp olive oil
- 15 oz can diced tomatoes
- 1/2 tsp dried oregano
- 1/2 tsp dried basil
- pinch red pepper flakes (optional)
- 1/2 tsp salt
- freshly cracked pepper to taste
- 2 Tbsp tomato paste
- ½ cup water
- 2 oz cream cheese
- 1/4 cup grated Parmesan
- 1/2-9 oz bag fresh spinach



Bring a large pot of water to boil over high heat. Add the pasta and cook until tender (7-10) minutes. Drain the pasta. While waiting for the pasta to cook, dice the onion and mince the garlic. Cook both in a large skillet with the olive oil over medium-low heat until softened and transparent (about 5 minutes). Add the diced tomatoes (with juices), oregano, basil, red pepper flakes, salt, and some freshly cracked pepper to the skillet. Stir to combine. Add the tomato paste and a 1/2 cup of water to the skillet and stir until the tomato paste is dissolved into the sauce. Turn the heat down to low. Cut the cream cheese into a few pieces and then add them to the skillet with the tomato sauce. Use a whisk to stir the sauce until the cream cheese has fully melted in and the sauce is creamy. Add half of the Parmesan to the skillet and whisk until it is melted in. Add the remainder of the parmesan and whisk until melted in again. Add the fresh spinach and gently stir it into the sauce until it has wilted (3-5 minutes). Add the pasta and stir until it is well coated in the creamy tomato sauce. Taste and adjust the salt and pepper as needed. Serve warm.
