Cambrian College Receives Big Boost For Entrepreneur Program

Fifteen young adults are taking part in a new program to help them develop their own business ideas and get them off the ground.

Cambrian College's Espanola campus was the host site for a federal MP who had a sizable cheque in hand for a new

program.

Sudbury MP Paul Lefebvre announced the \$358,000 investment yesterday morning on behalf of Employment, Workforce and Development Minister Patty Hajdu.

"This new project that will give youth in northeastern Ontario invaluable entrepreneurial skills training and facilitate business networking and mentorships," says Lefebvre. "Developing Canada's youth is a priority. Cambrian College's project is a concrete example of what we can achieve for youth by working in partnership with organizations across the country. Projects like this one can help put regular pay cheques into the reach of those who need it. But more than that, they give young Canadians the chance to change their future."

The money, which will be shared between the college's two campuses: Espanola and Little Current, is part of the Youth Entrepreneurship Skills Development Program.

College President Bill Best thanked Lefebvre for investing in local area youth and wishes the students success.

"This is an excellent example of Canadians helping Canadians," said Best. "Even if we have one success out of the program, it is a resounding success.

"We are rural here, not living where there are hundreds of thousands of people, so one success can make a huge difference to a community. I wish all the students success with the program."

Up to 15 students will be taking part in the program, which will be hosted at both locations.

Program Facilitator Celina Mantler adds the students will develop a business plan and will also meet with local community entrepreneurs during the course to help develop their ideas.

Skills Link supports projects that help young people who face more barriers to employment develop others to entrepreneurial skills and gain valuable business experience. The projects aim to assist young people who may not have completed high school, single parents, Indigenous youth, young persons with disabilities, youth living in rural or remote areas or newcomers.

Algoma-Manitoulin-Kapuskasing MP Carol Hughes was also in attendance to extend congratulations to all while emphasizing the importance of investing in youth educational initiatives.







The newlyweds made their home in Tehkummah on Manitoulin Island where Irwin was born and raised.

"Irwin had some carpentry skills, which came in handy both in earning a living and over the years building new homes to fit their growing family, one son and four daughters," says Bowerman. Recipe

We've all been there; you go outside and discover that somehow a monstrous zucchini has appeared overnight in your vegetable



garden or a well-meaning friend gives you a zucchini the size of a football. I have to admit, those zucchinis have ended up in my compost bin over the years, but not anymore! I have collected several recipes for grated zucchini that I love, and now I grate up those large zucchinis and freeze it in bags to use throughout the fall and winter. The following recipe is one of them, and is a great combination of zucchini, pineapple and coconut with a silky cream cheese frosting. I is moist and addictive.

Pineapple Zucchini Cake

- 1½ cups all-purpose flour
- 1½ cup granulated sugar
- ½ cup sweetened flaked coconut
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon salt
- freshly grated nutmeg to taste, optional
- 1 pinch ginger, optional
- 3 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 2 large eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 2 cups grated unpeeled zucchini (remove seeds if the zucchini is large)
- 1 (20-ounce) can crushed pineapple in juice, drained (reserve juice in case you need it for the cake batter or frosting)

Cream Cheese Frosting:

- 8 ounces cream cheese
- 2 tablespoons butter, softened
- 2 cups powdered sugar
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- splash of milk or pineapple juice, if necessary

Preheat the oven to 350°F. Spray a 9x13-inch baking pan with non-stick cooking spray. In a large bowl, combine the flour, sugar, coconut, baking soda, cinnamon, salt, nutmeg and ginger. In a small bowl, beat together the oil, eggs and vanilla. Add the mixture to the flour mixture, as well as the zucchini and pineapple. Stir until it all comes together. It might seem too dry to start, but continue to stir. If the batter is still dry, add a little bit of the pineapple juice to loosen it up. Pour the batter into the prepared pan. Bake until a tester inserted in the center comes out clean, 30-35 minutes. Cool completely. To make the frosting, beat the cream cheese and the butter together until light and fluffy. Add in the powdered sugar, beat to combine, then beat in the vanilla. Spread the frosting over the cooled cake. Store the cake covered in the refrigerator.


