TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers will hold a public meeting on **Wednesday, September 27, 2017 at 7:00 p.m.**, at the Township Office, 11 Birch Lake Road, Massey in order to consider proposed applications under Section 34 and Section 53 of the Planning Act, RSO 1990 as amended.

Consent File No. C-17-07

The purpose of this consent application is to allow for a new lot in the Rural zone. The property is described as Salter, Section 35, Parcel 5417, Plan 53R-17629 Part 1, 1689 River Road. The lands subject of this application is not subject of any other Planning Act application.

Consent File No. C-17-08

The purpose of this consent application is to allow for a new lot in the Rural zone. The property is described as McKinnon, Concession 4, Lot 9, Parcel 27673, Plan 53R-9499 Part 1, 250A Moose Lake Road.

The lands subject of this application is also subject of a Planning Act zoning bylaw amendment application, File ZBA17-01 as described below.

Consent File No. C-17-09

The purpose of this consent application is to allow for a new lot in the Rural zone. The property is described as Hallam, Concession 5, Lot 12, Parcel 9765, 221 Gannon Road. The lands subject of this application is not subject of any other Planning Act application.

Zoning Bylaw Amendment File No. ZBA-17-01

The purpose of this zoning bylaw amendment application is to allow the following on the severed and retained portions of Consent File No. C-17-08: reduced lot areas, lot frontages and lot depths, and frontage/access over Crown Land via a seasonal municipal road as is existing.

If you wish to be notified of the decision of the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers in respect of the proposed applications, you must make a written request to the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers. This will also entitle you to be advised of a possible Ontario Municipal Board Hearing. Even if you are the successful party, you should request a copy of the decision since the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers decision may be appealed to the Ontario Municipal Board by the applicant or another member of the public.

To appeal the decision to the Ontario Municipal Board, send an appeal form to the Clerk of the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers outlining the reasons for the appeal. You must enclose the appeal fee of \$300.00 for each application appealed, paid by cheque, made payable to the Ontario Minister of Finance.

If a person or public body that files an appeal of a decision of the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers in respect of the proposed consent does not make written submission to the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers before it gives or refuses to give a provisional consent, the Ontario Municipal Board may dismiss the appeal.

If a person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers before the zoning bylaw is passed, the person or public body is not entitled to appeal the decision of the Council of the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers to the Ontario Municipal Board, and may not be added as a part to the hearing of an appeal before the Ontario Municipal Board unless, in the opinion of the board, there are reasonable grounds to do so.

(pursuant to the provisions of Section 26 of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter P.13.)

TAKE NOTICE THAT the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers Council will hold a PUBLIC MEETING on:

THE PURPOSE of the Public Meeting is to invite comments from the public on revisions to be considered in updating the Official Plan. Revised and new policy areas for the update to the Plan include: building strong, healthy communities; providing a range and mix of housing types; planning for the integration and management of infrastructure and community services; conserving the natural environment, water resources and natural heritage resources; promoting alternative and renewable energy systems that reduce the dependence on fossil fuels, and planning for the impacts climate change; providing for local food security; ensuring land use compatibility and protection against natural and human-made hazards; protecting natural resources (i.e. minerals, agricultural lands, forests, pits and quarries) and coordinating land use decision making including consultation with Indigenous communities. The effect will be to better manage growth and development, community services and infrastructure in the Township over the next 10-20 years. As part of this review, Council is seeking input from the public on revisions to the Official Plan. The format of the meeting will include a presentation by the Township's planning consultant followed by an opportunity for the public to make verbal or submit written comments. Please mark your calendars and plan to attend this important meeting.

As this update pertains to all land within the jurisdictional limits of the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers, a key map has not been produced.

IF YOU WISH TO BE NOTIFIED of the decision of the Council of the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers on the proposed Official Plan Amendment, you must make written request to the Clerk of the Township (see address below).

IF A PERSON OR PUBLIC BODY DOES NOT MAKE ORAL SUBMISSIONS AT A PUBLIC MEETING OR MAKE WRITTEN SUBMISSIONS to the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers before the proposed Official Plan Amendment is adopted, the person or public body is not entitled to appeal the decision of the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing (approval authority) to the Ontario Municipal Board.

IF A PERSON OR PUBLIC BODY DOES NOT MAKE ORAL SUBMISSIONS AT A PUBLIC MEETING OR MAKE WRITTEN SUBMISSIONS to the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers before the proposed Official Plan Amendment is adopted, the person or public body may not be added as a party to the hearing of an appeal before the Ontario Municipal Board unless, in the opinion of the Board, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.



Third Annual ATV Ride Just Around The Corner – Join Your Local Firefighters To Fight Muscular Dystrophy

Fall is in the air and with it comes one of the most popular events held in the Autumn in the Espanola area ... it's time for the Third Annual Espanola Fire Association ATV Poker Run where local firefighters, their families, friends and supporters, come together to raise funds for the cause.

Trevor McVey has been involved since the beginning and he loves the opportunity to get down and dirty for such a great cause.

"It's a fantastic way for people to spend time together and help out the cause," explained McVey. "The ride itself is four to five hours long and we cap off the day with a nice dinner."

"This year the run will be through the Bass Lake to House Lake area and back capped off with a dinner at the Espanola Elks Hall."

McVey says the run has raised over \$7,000 the first two years.

"We raised \$7,000 over the last two years and we are just blown away by the response, which is absolutely terrific. We are hoping to grow on that and have set a

goal of \$5,000 for this year. The number of participants has also grown; 93 the first year, 198 last year. Our maximum is 250 because the Elks hall can't fill any more than that. I think we will accomplish that quite easily this year."

The firefighters, including Espanola, have long been known for their support in fighting muscular dystrophy. Since its incorporation, Muscular Dystrophy Canada has been supported by more than 800 fire departments and associations across Canada, which raise over \$3 million annually to fight the disease. Fire Fighters are Muscular Dystrophy Canada's largest network of supporters.

Muscular dystrophy (MD) is a group of muscle diseases that results in increasing weakening and breakdown of skeletal muscles over time. The disorders differ in which muscles are primarily affected, the degree of weakness, how fast they worsen, and when symptoms begin. Many people will eventually become

unable to walk.

There are nine main categories of muscular dystrophy that contain more than thirty specific types. The most common type is Duchenne muscular dystrophy (DMD) which typically affects males beginning around the age of four. The disease is genetic: MDs are due to mutations in genes that are involved in making muscle proteins. This can occur due to either inheriting the defect from one's parents or the mutation occurring during early development. Diagnosis often involves blood tests and genetic testing.

There is no cure for muscular dystrophy. Physical therapy, braces, and corrective surgery may help with some symptoms. Duchenne muscular dystrophy, which represents about half of all cases of muscular dystrophy, affects about one in 5,000 males at birth. Muscular dystrophy was first described in the 1830s by Charles Bell. The word "dystrophy" is from the Greek dys, meaning "difficult" and troph

meaning "nourish".

Research dollars are used to try and find a cure. Gene therapy, as a treatment, is in the early stages of study in humans.

The Third Annual Espanola Fire Association ATV Poker Run is set for Saturday, September 9th Registration is from nine to ten am with the run to follow. The entry fee is \$40 per person, which also includes the dinner. Pledges and additional donations are also appreciated. McVey says the support from the business community has been terrific.

"It's just amazing how the businesses in Espanola and the North Shore have stepped up to assist us with this fundraiser, so we will have draws for some really terrific prizes following the dinner. We are all excited to see the poker run grow even more this year. Thanks to everyone for helping out and see you on the trail!"

Not exactly!," chuckles Grant. "The United States Bought the Danish West Indies for 25 million dollars and quickly renamed them the U.S. Virgin Islands; the Russian Revolution began, the Czar abdicated, the United States enters the Great War and Canada proves its courage and strength at Vimy Ridge. And to the delight of the youngsters, Raggedy -Ann appears in stores.

"And Melvin Jones...whoa... who is Melvin Jones? Melvin Jones was a Chicago insurance man and chair of his local business club. In June, he challenged his membership to use their business skills to improve their community. And the Lions Club was born, one hundred years ago."

Since then, over 200 countries have embraced the aims and ideals of Lionism which is the focus of its direction: "We Serve." In 1920, the first Lions club was founded in Windsor, Ontario. Today, there are over 1.4- million Lions around the world.

Why the Lion? Lewis says certain traits of the lion appealed to the founders of the club and explains how the logo was designed.

"They especially appreciated the strength, courage, activity and loyalty of the regal beast,"

explains Lewis. "The logo features two lions on either side of a blue circular shape with a large gold "L" in the middle. They face away from the centre, symbolizing looking back to the past and forward to the future. On top in gold is "Lions", and below is "International".

In 1925, Helen Keller addressed a Lions convention and first used the phrase, "Knights of the Blind." To this day, June 1st is Helen Keller Day, a day when Lions International introduces new programs for the blind.

Until 1968, local clubs dedicated themselves to mainly local needs. Then Lions International was formed to extend programs worldwide. Many of those programs were adopted at home.

"In 1984 Lions Quest, a program for elementary schools was introduced and used in Espanola schools for years," says Lewis. "Sight First", "Opening Eyes", and "Sight for Kids", were a few of many programs funded by Lions International. \$15 million dollars was given to alleviate the misery of the South Asian Tsunami in 2004. Other Lions International aid programs included: \$5 million to Hurricane Katrina;

& 6 million to Haiti; \$12 million to Japan following the devastating earthquake in 2011; \$12 million to support the "One Shot, One Life" program. This program was co-ordinated with the Gates Foundation to inoculate millions of children for measles."

And that does not include what the Lions do locally. The dedicated volunteers assist with the annual telethon for Christmas, plus host a local toy drive in the Espanola and North Shore area, host food drives throughout the year to assist the Espanola Helping Hand Food Bank and are always quick to assist when there is a crisis. They are also quite popular for their successful hosting of the annual Seniors Appreciation Dinner, which has been renamed the Paul

and Hester Zahorec Dinner in memory of the pair who were dedicated volunteers before their passing. And what would Christmas be without the Lions bringing in Santa for the day to meet with the kids? And the list goes on and on.

Since 1968, Lions International has donated just over \$1 billion.

Lewis adds as Lionism enters its second century, the local club will continue to serve Espanola and the North Shore as best they can. The local Lions will also be sharing more of their story over the next year and celebrate the centennial by continuing to give back to the community. Webbwood Public School – Sweet Beginnings And Now Sweet Endings



By Edith Presseau - School starts this week and children, parents and friends are always anxious and excited to begin another year. Sadly, this year, there will be a big change for children living in Webbwood. Their school has been officially closed for financial constraint reasons by the Rainbow District School Board. Not only has the community lost an integral partner in Webbwood, it has lost a community centre, an activity area and so much more. One of its former students, Edith Presseau, keenly feels the loss and took it upon herself to write a bit about the history and her time at the school. This is part one of a two-part series recalling her time as a part of Webbwood Public School.

I am Edith Presseau, maiden name St.Michel, and I grew up in Webbwood Public School. I was here when we had a full house. There weren't extra rooms and the school yard was bustling. It was a great place to be a kid. And I think that we have to remember just that ... It doesn't matter during which era you are a kid in, or where you were a kid, it's always a time of freedom, curiosity and learning. And having been connected to Webbwood School in many different capacities for the past 40 ... some years, I have to say that the students who have come through these rooms hold precious memories and have learned a lot. It is thank you to the staff and community who invested

so much of themselves that I confidently say, GROWING UP IN WEBBWOOD was the best thing that ever happened to me!

In April of 1989, our school hosted a reunion and thanks to Barb Philip's keen journalism skills, I'd like to share some of what appeared in the Mid-North Monitor in May of that year.

Following Jennie McLandress' 1894-1900 "home school," the first bricks and mortar Webbwood School was built. It consisted of four classrooms and offered instruction for grades 1 through 10. When it was destroyed by fire in 1955, students were relocated to this site and into a brand new, state of the art two-room school.

My Aunt Enid was in grade 6, Aunt Laura in Grade 5 while Uncle Carson was in Grade 3. In speaking with them it was exciting times and ... just like now the thought of having a "new" learning environment was both daunting and exciting. There is one thing that we can always count on and that is change. So as we go through my recollection of Webbwood's history and my time here, please keep in mind that we are not the only school that has closed nor will we be the last. What we do have is the opportunity to hold dearly all that we have gained from this building and most importantly from the people who gave us the gift of knowledge.

During my time, the original two

1956 classes, were known as Miss Sloss' and Mr. Matchett's rooms and of course the "up the hill" bathrooms. Oh ... The bathrooms, I'm certain that every graduating class has a story about those bathrooms. If we weren't swinging the railings, Doug was going headfirst into the garbage can. Mr. Batman couldn't get there fast enough. No bullying involved – it was just the innocence of country kids. We were a close knit family, where everyone looked out for one another.

Then in the '60s when the boomers started sending their children to school, our population grew. The one room school houses in Shakespeare and Pleasant Valley couldn't sustain their numbers and busing to Webbwood began. Two more rooms were added. The centre wall of these rooms was retractable in order to open them up for concerts and open concept teaching. I'm thinking that you know which rooms I speak of? The kitchen with the "drive through" window was now available to offer sweet treats during outdoor games days, and especially sweet were the pop and chips given on the last day of school by Mr. Solomon from the bus company.

It was during this time that my grandmother, Ann St.Michel left the Shakespeare school to join the staff in Webbwood. In 1969 my mother, Edith St.Michel would join the staff and team teach with grandma, offering cutting edge, progressive education to the students of Webbwood, publishing always kitchen tried and student tested cookbooks and specialty greeting cards. Webbwood School has consistently been a place of pride, as I've already said being

curious, innovative and risk taking was always part of our mandate here. Students were given their best chance... even Mrs. Launder's class of 40+ students and mostly boys keeping her on her toes, or the stealthiness of one industrious student during French class who tied Mme Bruneau's shoes laces to her portable French cart; school feasts, art shows, community involvement and partnerships were just that; participation and involvement were an expected part of being "Webbwood."

In the 1970's it was a practise that the wall of the primary classes be opened so that for two weeks, students would receive project based art and music lessons. We would group together to plan, share ideas (and sometimes they were the impossible) and use found materials ... they were the best! The little rock art lion, complete with furry mane, still sits in my garden today. Or memories of the mosaic we reproduced of "A Sunday Afternoon on the Island of La Grande Jatte by Georges Seurat," that took up the entire wall in one classroom, still brings such sense of accomplishment and happiness. Following the long periods of work sessions we regrouped to sing! Everyone gathered around the piano or guitar and joined in for concert preparations. Our school hosted the most amazing sounds of traditional Christmas carols and if we were lucky we were always treated to some requests following our practises, which included: "One Tin Soldier" by The Original Caste or "Tie a Yellow Ribbon 'round the Old Oak Tree" by Tony Orlando.

Back to School Safety



**Every Child Should Have A Safe Walk To School
Slow Down, Beware, And Drive Safe**

Get Prepared for Back to School Safety!

It's back to school time! - As school doors open, traffic gets a little heavier on our streets. People are back from holidays, school buses and public transit are on regular routes, and more people are walking, cycling or driving to school.

To help with the transition and share the roads safely, read our safety tips. Help everyone stay safe this school year!

1) Observe School Zone Speeds

Although you should always obey posted speed limits, it is especially important during the school year. Children crossing the road on their way to and from school can easily get distracted and step into harm's way. Slowing down and being vigilant is crucial to keeping kids safe. Children are often out throughout the day at recess, lunch, and for certain classes, so it's important to drive slowly throughout the day.

2) Obey the Crossing Guard

A crossing guard is there to keep children safe. If you come up to a set of lights, and the light turns green, but the crossing guard still says stop, follow his/her direction and not the traffic light. There might be a child still crossing the street that you can't see.

3) Watch for Darting Children

Kids are small and easily distracted, and for drivers, this can create dangerous situations on the roads. Be vigilant and alert behind the wheel. You never know when a small child might step out from between parked cars or off a sidewalk. Your fast reflexes might be needed to prevent an accident.

4) School Buses

Most mishaps take place outside the bus. Make sure children don't arrive too early at the bus stop where they can wander or get into mischief. Make sure children wait well away from the road and stay back until the school bus makes a full stop and the doors open. Explain that they must walk at least three metres (10 feet) away when crossing in front of the bus so the driver can see them. When driving your car near a school bus please note that extra caution is needed. You shouldn't pass a school bus when the signal lights are flashing (as children are often crossing the road at that time), and drive slowly as a general precaution.

The following information is useful for school bus passengers and their parents.

Rules for getting on the bus safely:

1. Be at the bus stop on time. Never run to or from the bus.
2. Wait at the designated stop in a safe place well back from the side of the road.
3. Remember the danger zone around the bus. The danger zone is anywhere close enough to touch the bus. The bus driver cannot see you when you are in the danger zone.
4. If you cross the street to get on the bus: when the bus comes, wait until it has come to a complete stop. The bus driver will make sure all the traffic stops. The stop arm will be out and the red lights will be flashing. Watch the driver. When the driver knows it is safe, he or she will signal you to cross, but watch for traffic yourself. Walk, don't run.
5. Hold the hand rail as you get on the bus. Don't push or shove.

Rules for on the bus:

1. Take your seat as quickly as possible and sit properly, facing forward at all times.
2. Hold bags and parcels in your lap. Do not put your feet into the aisle: someone might trip.
3. Keep your head, arms and everything inside the bus. Don't throw anything out the windows or around in the bus.

4. Talk quietly. The driver must concentrate to drive the bus safely.
5. Save snacks for snack time at school or for when you get home. They may spill or you may choke if the bus goes over a big bump.
6. No fighting, shouting or playing in or around the bus.
7. Always follow the bus driver's instructions.

Rules for leaving the bus safely:

1. When you leave the bus, hold

- the handrail and step away from the bus.
2. To cross the street in front of the bus, walk ahead at least 10 giant steps (three metres). Cross only when the driver gives a signal. Cross the street in single file.
3. If you drop something near the bus, don't pick it up. Tell the driver or another adult first.
4. If everyone is getting off the bus, the people at the front leave first. Do not push.
5. Be familiar with the bus driver's rules for emergencies.

Shoes That Fit Perfectly Prevent Injuries

If you've ever bought a pair of shoes that didn't fit well just because they were on sale, or looked too fabulous to pass up, you are certainly not alone. However, experts caution against these 'great buys', since ill-fitting footwear is one of the leading causes of preventable foot and lower limb injuries.

"Shoes that are too long, too short, too tight, or too wide not only cause painful rubbing and squeezing, they can also force the wearer to adjust their natural gait," says Alison Smith, a Canadian certified pedorthist. "This in turn can cause them to shift their pressure and weight, often leading to pain and injury."

Smith says fashionistas and bargain shoppers aren't the only people who wear ill-fitting footwear. Many of us inadvertently wear poorly fitting shoes because we don't know how to tell if a shoe fits properly.

If you are fitting your own shoes, certified pedorthists advise the shoes should feel comfortable the moment you try them on. It is a myth that snug-fitting shoes will stretch over time. Make sure you have room to wiggle your toes, especially when you're standing and that the heel of the shoe fits snugly around your own heel. Also make sure you buy shoes that match the shape of your foot. If your foot is wide and square, you should purchase shoes that are wide

through the top. Most importantly, you should never assume you are always the same shoe size. Feet shift and change over time and different shoes fit differently, so you should have both of your feet measured often.

Painful, injured feet can have a serious impact on your mobility. To make sure you can keep doing the things you love, always buy supportive, well-fitting shoes. More information on fitting shoes properly can be found at www.pedorthic.ca.

Get The Perfect Fit

To ensure your footwear fits properly Canadian certified pedorthists recommend you follow these steps:

- Get your feet measured by a professional fitter, preferably using a Brannock device.
- Take the insoles out of your shoes and stand on them. Make sure you have a thumb width between the longest toe and the end of the insole. Also check that your first and fifth toe fit on the insole and don't hang off.
- Shoes should bend at the widest point of your foot, where your foot bends.
- Laces or Velcro will help to ensure your shoe fits snugly and supports the movement of your foot.

The 2016 Census ... What Does It Tell Us About ... Ourselves?

Statistics Canada has some interesting details in its release of the 2016 Census, like we are growing, but that is thanks to immigration and not new births, common law and same sex marriages are on the rise, and living alone is also going up.

Canada's population increased to 35,151,728 last year largely driven by growth in the West, according to 2016 census data released Wednesday, August 2, 2017 by Statistics Canada.

The country's population has grown five per cent since the last census in 2011, when it was at 33.5 million, the highest rate of growth among G7 countries. However, the growth rate declined from the 5.9 per cent increase recorded in 2011.

About two-thirds of the increase recorded in 2016 was due to net immigration into the country, while the rest was from new births.

Canadians are living increasingly alone and without children too.

The number of Canadians living alone increased to its greatest share since Confederation and was the most common type of household in the country in 2016, representing 28.2 per cent of all households in Canada.

That is an increase from 25.7 per cent in 2001. Fully 13.9 per cent of the Canadian adult population now live by themselves. That figure stood at just 1.8 per cent in 1951.

According to Statistics Canada, this puts Canada well in line with the United Kingdom and the United States, though countries like France and Germany have more single-person households.

The single-person household is most common in Quebec at 33.3 per cent, while British Columbia and Nova Scotia also have more single-person households than the Canadian average. The lowest rates could be found in Nunavut (18.9 per cent), while less than one in four adults in Alberta and Newfoundland and Labrador were living alone.

Due to its aging population, the biggest increase in single-person households occurred in the Atlantic provinces, with rates of growth two to four times greater

than Canada as a whole. Women are more likely than men to be living alone due to their longer life expectancy. On the bright side, however, the share of senior women living alone has decreased.

"This is the result of an aging population," said Johanne Denis, a director general at Statistics Canada. "We're also seeing higher rates of separation and divorce, delayed couple formation among younger Canadians and more women in the labour force. These are trends that other countries are also experiencing."

And less kids for the time being anyway ... The 2016 census found that the rate of growth since 2011 among couples living without children has been greater than among those couples living with children, at 7.2 per cent to 2.3 per cent.

Couples with at least one child represented 51.1 per cent of all couples, their lowest share on record. The biggest decline occurred in Atlantic Canada, with Nova Scotia having the lowest share at 42.8 per cent.

Nunavut had the highest share of couples living with children at 76.5 per cent, while the Northwest Territories, Ontario, Alberta and Manitoba were all above the national average.

"The growth is fuelled by boomers becoming empty-nesters," said Laurent Martel, director of the demography division at Statistics Canada.

The census also found that 69.7 per cent of all children under the age of 15 live with both their biological parents, while 6.1 per cent live with two parents, one of them a step-parent. But just under one-fifth of Canadian children live in single-parent households — four-fifths of them with a single mother. However, the rate of single-father households has increased significantly since 2001.

Common law and same sex couples are on the rise. Though married couples still form the majority of couples in Canada, the share of common law couples has increased dramatically since 1981 to 21.3 per cent from 6.3

per cent.

After Nunavut, where half of couples are common law, Quebec has the highest share of unmarried couples at 39.9 per cent. That gives Quebec a far higher share of common law couples than some countries like Norway and Sweden that have relatively high rates.

According to the census, 42.7 per cent of common law couples in Quebec live with children. The rate in other Canadian provinces is just 11.7 per cent.

The number of same-sex couples in Canada has also increased, up 60.7 per cent from 2006, while the rate of growth among all couples has been just 9.6 per cent over that time.

The census counts 72,880 same-sex couples in Canada, representing 0.9 per cent of all couples. About half of them live in Toronto, Montreal, Vancouver and Ottawa-Gatineau.

About 12 per cent of same-sex couples live with children, well below the 51.4 per cent of opposite-sex couples that do. About four-fifths of same-sex couples with children are female.

And as for the kids who still with their parents ... while more Canadians might be living alone and without children,

Canadian parents with children are seeing them stay at home for a longer time. Among Canadians between the ages of 20 and 34, 34.7 per cent still live with their parents, with Ontario having the highest rate in the country. That is up from 30.6 per cent in the 2001 census. Toronto is the city with the most young adults yet to leave the nest at just under half, or 47.4 per cent.

Accordingly, the share of young adults living both outside of their parents' homes and with families of their own has fallen to 41.9 per cent from 49.1 per cent in 2001.

"Economic conditions and the higher cost of housing, particularly in the Greater Toronto Area, are behind this increase in children living with their parents for a longer time," said Denis.

Multi-generational households, however, are the fastest growing in the country — up 37.5 per cent since 2001, a greater rate of increase than households in general. This could be explained by the greater frequency of multi-generational households among Indigenous and immigrant communities, two growing sectors of the population.

Criminal charges of Fraud Over \$5,000.00 and Fraud Under \$5,000.00 were laid against the female who is to appear in the Ontario Court of Justice in Espanola on October 23, 2017 to answer to the charges.

Jump Day Sees Some 100 New Students At Ehs - Some Programming And Athletic Changes



School bells will be ringing and school buses running very soon, but for new students at Espanola High that came a little early. Jump Day 2017 was held on Wednesday, August 30th to welcome some 100 new Spartans to the central high school in Espanola. Principal Marty Punkari welcomed students, parents and staff to the gathering sharing some basic information with them.

He says Espanola High prides itself on respect for everyone adding, "when something happens, 10% is what happened, the other 90% is how you react to it. Maintaining a positive attitude will help you here (at EHS)." Punkari added the students hail from six feeder communities throughout North Shore and students will definitely find some big differences. For example, the new library, located on the left in the main lobby, is now complete and construction is finishing up on a relaxation room for students who are facing a stressful situation. Besides guidance counsellors, there is also a social worker on staff as well. He also noted that programming is changing for Grade nine students this year. "We are placing a strong

emphasis on English and Math, so those courses are now a year long while others are only a semester. We want to make sure (you) have a good strong start with the programming."

Punkari added the students can also begin their volunteer civic hours right away. All students in Ontario must complete 40 hours of civic volunteering to graduate.

Following the presentation by staff, everyone took in exploring the classrooms, finding their lockers, and meeting their teachers.

School officially starts Wednesday morning, September 6th.

Recipe

I work with one of the best bakers in town and she was kind enough to share the following recipe with me. She says the secret is to use a large navel orange and to use butter not margarine.

I have heard from someone who has had these muffins that they are moist, delicious and disappear quickly when served. I can't wait to try them.

Orange Raisin Muffins

- 1 whole navel orange (seeds removed)
- ½ cup orange juice
- ½ cup raisins OR chopped dates
- 1 egg
- ½ cup butter
- 1 ½ cups all-purpose flour
- ¾ cup white sugar
- 1 tsp baking soda
- 1 tsp baking powder
- ½ tsp salt



Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Line or grease 12 muffin cups. Cut the orange into pieces and remove any seeds. Put the whole orange, peel and all, with the orange juice into a blender and whirl until peel is finely chopped. Drop in the egg and butter and blend until just combined. Mix together the dry ingredients with the raisins/dates. Pour orange mixture over dry ingredients and stir only until moistened. Fill prepared muffin cups ¾ full. (Makes 9 to 12 muffins depending on size of orange and if you add extra raisins/dates) Bake for 15-20 minutes.


