







Good Doctors Medical Host Grand Opening



By Rosalind Russell - Espanola and North Shore Corridor now have a walk-in clinic for people who have no doctor.

The Good Doctors Medical walk in clinic officially opened its doors the week of April 9th at Robinson's Pharmasave in Espanola's downtown. Ashton Labonte, the nurse manager for Good Doctors, says it is a walk in clinic only and appointments are not needed to access care.

Patients who need immediate attention can walk in to access services and if necessary, follow up visits via video conference with doctors from the Toronto area.

Lebonte adds clients can ask for a female or male doctor.

If follow up care is needed, those arrangements are made with the reception staff.

As well, anyone who comes in who does not have an OHIP card can still receive care.

"We have had Americans come in and others who do not have coverage, but they are aware they have to pay for their health care and are willing to do so. Our fees are fair and sometimes even less than what they would pay if they went elsewhere."

Lebonte says the doctors can also provide extra forms, such as doctors notes, but there is also a small fee for that as well.

The clinic is open Monday to Friday, 9:00am to 5:00pm.

Two days into the trip (which if you're rowing means you can still see two revolving restaurants and a drug deal going down in Fort Lauderdale) Kenneth witnessed the last gasping bubbles from the holes in his supply raft as it headed for the ocean floor with all his food and water.

Now, a lot of men would have quit at this point. And so would have Kenneth except that a storm kept overturning his Sears raft and he was just too busy climbing back into the boat and watching his stomach impersonate a bilge pump to really call the whole thing off. And essentially, that's how

Kenneth Maffei spent his vacation to Fort Lauderdale on spring break: bobbing for air and climbing back into his overturned raft for 14 days on the Atlantic Ocean.

Whereas most of us put on a few pounds while on holidays, Kenneth, sticking to a strict regimen of rainwater and slimy, little sea urchins that cling to the rotting seaweed that kept washing into the raft every time he righted it, well Kenneth actually lost weight.

Oh, and did I mention Kenneth got a little off course during his trip? Needless to say, he never quite made it to islands off the Bahamas but he sure got off-shore. In fact, during his 14 days at sea (some of that time actually spent in the raft) Kenneth was off the shores of south Florida, north Florida, Georgia, South Carolina and North Carolina.

Domtar Fined After White Powder Spill In Espanola



By Rosalind Russell - he Ministry of the Environment and Climate Change has fined Domtar's Espanola paper mill for failing to notify the ministry of a spill of sodium sulphate salt, referred to as salt cake.

The ministry convicted Domtar Inc., of an Environmental Protection Act violation for failing to notify the ministry of a spill on or about August 29, 2016.

The discharge was as a result of a salt cake buildup and a resulting failure of a precipitator on a recovery

boiler.

Although salt cake is a white, odourless powder and is regarded as non-toxic, several complaints were received from area residents who indicated that the substance coated their vehicles, yards and outdoor furniture.

Domtar did not report the discharge to the ministry until August 30, 2016.

The company was convicted earlier this month on April 12 and was fined \$50,000 plus a victim fine surcharge of \$12,500.

Espanola elderly couple defrauded of over \$100,000 - emergency scam

An elderly Espanola couple has been defrauded of over \$100,000.

The Espanola Police Service undertook an investigation into the fraud, in which the couple were victims of a popular scam known as the 'emergency scam'.

The investigation determined that the fraud suspect contacted the elderly couple claiming to be a lawyer in Ottawa, informing them their son had been arrested and needed to send money for his bail and legal services.

The suspect also had someone pretend to be their son, verifying he was in jail and needed help.

The fraud escalated and the fraudster was successful in obtaining several money transfers in excess of \$100,000,

from the victims over a period of several weeks.

Espanola Police urge the public to be extremely cautious of anyone attempting to obtain money through telephone, online or e-mail contact. If you receive a call from someone claiming to be a family member in trouble, make your own inquiries to determine the validity of the claim before providing any funds. Be aware of red flags such as "don't talk to anyone" or suggestion that your loved one is unable to speak with you directly for some reason (injury, incarceration, etc).

Espanola Police believe that the suspect may have targeted other people in the area, and request that anyone with a similar incident contact the office for investigation.

Rising Lead Levels In Northern Ontario Elementary Schools



MPP. Algoma Manitoulin Michael Mantha says the Liberal is neglecting government elementary schools by failing to take action on the 33 schools in the Sudbury and Algoma-Manitoulin area, which recently tested for higher than provincially acceptable lead levels in their water.

AB Ellis, Espanola High, S. Geiger on the North Shore corridor and Central Manitoulin, Assiginack and Manitoulin Secondary on the Island have all tested above the acceptable provincial drinking water standards for lead according to an October 2017 report by Sudbury District Health (SDU).

Since then, Mantha explained, his constituency office as well

as that of France Gélinas, NDP MPP for Nickel Belt, have both received concerned inquiries from parents across the region. A trend like this can be harmful to the health of our children and something has to be done,

stressed Mantha. The province has yet to respond to his inquiries.

Meanwhile, SDU savs lead levels in water at area schools are constantly flushed and fixtures tested over a three-year period.

SDU environmental manager, Burgess Hawkins, says lead levels in area schools that are higher than the provincial limit set in the Ontario Drinking Water Guidelines are flushed every day.

Hawkins says the lead, which has shown up in the 33 schools, is not likely from the water source itself, if on municipal water, as this is tested by the municipalities.

He adds flushing is done every day where tests of standing water have shown an exceedance and there is little reason for the public to be overly concerned.

The health unit will continue to monitor the situation for the next three years, but responds to all adverse water notifications.



Hughes Calls For Real National Pharmacare



Canadians shouldn't have to struggle to pay for prescription drugs and a national Pharmacare program is the best answer, according Algoma-Manitoulinto Kapuskasing MP. Carol Hughes.

Hughes delivered a petition calling for Pharmacare in parliament and provided some solid reasons the government

should get on board with the idea.

One in five people is unable to fill their prescriptions due to financial reasons, said Hughes. Despite a government promise to study a limited version of Pharmacare contained in this year's budget, Hughes says Canadians would be best served by a full program that brings the most economic benefit.

Hughes adds Canada is the only country in the world with a universal Medicare system that does not include prescription drugs.

She adds that is why people are asking the government to work with the provinces to implement a universal pharmacare program as part of our public health care system.

Hughes Addresses Protecting Pensions

Algoma-Manitoulin-Kapuskasing MP. Carol Hughes joined fellow party MPs Scott Duvall and Charlie Angus at a cross-country tour to meet with workers and stakeholders to discuss Duvall's legislation, which would protect pensions workers and retirees have earned.

Hughes says there have been too many examples of unfair treatment of employees and their pensions when companies fail and they are demanding change in how pension schemes are treated when companies fail. Under current legislation, large

multinational corporations are using Canada's inadequate bankruptcy laws to take money meant for workers' pensions and divert it to pay off their secure creditors, which in many cases are often their parent companies.

New Democrats want to level the playing field by fixing federal bankruptcy laws so workers' pensions and health benefits are given the same consideration secured as creditors.

Recipe

Fall apart, juicy, tender, roast is easy enough to make for an everyday meal but also delicious enough for company. The



secret to a tender roast is to seal in the juices first at a high heat in the oven, and then turn the oven down to let it continue to cook. If your roast isn't super tender, then it just needs more time in the oven; even 30 more minutes can make the world of difference between an "okay" roast and a melt-in-your-mouth one. I like to prepare gravy with the juices and make hot roast beef sandwiches.

Tender Baked Roast

- 1 3-5 pound chuck roast, trimmed of excess fat
- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 garlic clove, peeled and sliced
- 3 cups beef broth
- 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
- 3 tablespoons dry minced onion
- 2 tablespoons beef bouillon powder
- 1 teaspoon onion powder
- 1 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1 bay leaf
- 1 teaspoon salt
- ¹/₂ teaspoon pepper



L Preheat oven to 425 degrees F. Heat olive oil over high heat in a large non-stick skillet. Using tongs, sear meat on all sides until lightly browned and transfer to a roasting pan. Place the slices of garlic clove into the crevices of the roast (usually where there is a seam of fat). Add desired amount of carrots surrounding roast. In a medium bowl, whisk together all remaining ingredients and pour over roast and carrots. Cover tightly with foil and roast for 30 minutes at 425 degrees F. Turn roast over, re-cover with foil and TURN OVEN DOWN to 300 degrees F. Continue to roast for an additional 4-5 hours at 300 degrees F. Roast is ready when it is fall apart tender. Remove roast and carrots from oven to a serving platter and let roast sit 30 minutes before carving to reabsorb the juices.

Make gravy from the drippings/juices if desired.
