

So I was about to say yeah, I am a "wine guy" but a big strong robust red kind of "wine guy". A "Shiraz guy", if you must know.



# Mantha Speaks Out In Support Of Killens. Algoma-Manitoulin Mpp Tries To Resolve Board Versus Trustee Impasse

You may have heard that in the Legislature I brought forward the concerns of frustrated parents, students. and residents of Manitoulin Island who are voicing their concerns regarding measures taken by the Rainbow District School Board (RDSB). RDSB has banned Trustee Larry Killens from all board meetings for the remainder of his elected term. This in effect means the entire region has no elected representative at any school board meetings until after the next election. Upon reviewing the board policy, it seems that the board has no such authority to take this action. This needs to be looked into by an outside authority. If this is true, it is undemocratic and improper. I have spoken with Education

I have spoken with Education Minister Lisa Thompson on several occasions about this matter. Her response is simply that she is not getting involved because it is entirely a Board matter. She says that it's up to the parents to take this up with the school board. The problem is that parents and citizens have been trying to do this and have been getting no response. In fact parents organized a "town hall" meeting and invited board members and the director to attend to try to help the community fully understand and resolve the issue. The meeting was well attended by over 100 Island community members but no representative from the board appeared.

Chase Lammi played last season for the Sudbury Wolves minor midget AAA team, posting 40 points in 51 games. The 5'10" 175lbs Lammi played 5 games as an affiliate last season for the Rayside Balfour Canadians during their playoff run, scoring a goal and an assist. Lammi was even chosen to play in their last game of the league championship as the RBC staff chose to scratch 2 regulars to play him instead.

"Chase is an incredibly hard working player and his relentless attitude will pay dividends in our league," commented Chad Clarke GM of the Express. "Lammi fit right in with the RBC lineup and did not look out of place last year and we expect him to do the same with us this year," added Clarke.

Also joining the Express for the upcoming season will be

We are aware that previous months have been increasingly difficult for some requiring medical care, however, we look forward to serving our patients at a greater capacity with additional services in the upcoming months.



# Recipe

keeping with zucchini theme this month. my mother in law has shared a favourite zucchini recipe with me. It's a creamy, flavourful, side



dish that is a great way to use up some of those larger sized zucchinis.

#### Saucy Zucchini

- ½ large zucchini, skin on, sliced
- 1 onion sliced
- 2 tbsp flour
- 2 tbsp butter
- ½ tsp salt, dash of pepper
- 1 cup milk
- ½ cup bread crumbs
- ½ tbsp melted butter
- Grated cheddar cheese (1/2 cup or more if desired)
- Caraway seeds (optional)

Place zucchini and onion slices in a pot with water just covering, and on a low boil cook until zucchini and onion is just tender and drain. Make the white sauce. In a small, heavy saucepan, melt the butter over low heat. Blend the flour into the melted butter. Add 1/4 teaspoon of salt and a dash of freshly ground black pepper. Cook over low heat, stirring, for at least 2 minutes to minimize 'flour' taste. Slowly add 1 cup of milk, stirring constantly. Continue cooking slowly until smooth and thickened. Place zucchini and onion in a casserole dish and pour over the white sauce. Mix the bread crumbs with melted butter (for added flavour a sprinkle of caraway seed can be added to the bread crumbs) and grated cheese and sprinkle on top. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.
