The North East Local Health Integration Network is supporting an Admission Avoidance Nurse at the Espanola Regional Hospital and Health Centre who will develop complex care plans for patients.

A Behavioural Supports Ontario Clinician will also work to reduce patient transfers from long-term care to an acute or specialized unit for behaviours.

The Nasty In The International 'Name Shame Game'

Since the 1970s, countries around the world Nemtsov Plaza in honour one of Putin's have been sticking it to their sworn enemies by changing the names of the streets in the capital cities on which those rivals have their embassies.

It seems to have begun in 1981 when Iran, in a war of words with Great Britain, changed the name of the street in Tehran in front of the British Embassy from Winston Churchill Street to Bobby Sands Street. This was a not-so-subtle reminder to all who entered or passed Britain's diplomatic enclave that the hunger striker of the Irish Republic had died in an English jail. Not to be outflanked, the Brits simply knocked out a wall of their building and created a new embassy entrance on the side street.

In 1984 the U.S. government changed the name of the street in front of Washington's Soviet Embassy to Andrei Sakharov Plaza to honour Russia's best-known dissident. Every person, diplomat or delivery driver was reminded of Sakharov's tortuous treatment in a Soviet jail. Moscow was infuriated. According to his family, this clever bit of 'name shaming' resulted in Sakharov's release, two years later.

Now the Americans are at it again, this time changing the street name in front of the Russian Embassy in Washington to Boris

most powerful critics who was shot in broad daylight three years ago while walking near the Kremlin. Nemtsov is but one of perhaps 38 dissidents and journalists Putin is believed to have murdered. Even President Donald Trump's curious public bromance with Vladimir Putin can't stop this transnational slam.

Furious Moscow is threatening to change the name of the street in front of their U.S. Embassy to "North American Dead End." Not the wittiest of comebacks, I'd have gone with "President Trump Dough Boy Drive." Or "Avenue Of The Ugly Americans."

Iraq's Saddam Hussein may have earned the title of "The Great Insulter" when, during the 1991 Gulf War he had the face of President George H. W. Bush cemented into the entrance of Baghdad's Al Rasheed Hotel. Popular with foreign guests and journalists, every visitor to the hotel had no choice but to walk over the face of the U.S. president ... the ultimate insult in Arab countries. During the second Bush invasion of Iraq (Dubya's wrong guess on weapons of mass destruction) U.S. soldiers used hammers and chisels to dig out the mosaic of George H. W.'s face.

Councillor Ray Dufour says keeping in mind the budget, he strongly believes council should have the opportunity to have a say in filling vacancies or new hires.


A hiring freeze of sorts has asking council to allow for a review before any position is filled.

Espanola Public Library working on a new **Strategic Plan**



It's Back To Work For Espanola's Domtar Pulp Mill Employees

Approximately 150 workers who were laid off at the Espanola pulp mill are back at work, as of Friday, February 16th. following a 48-hour shutdown.

Unifor Local 74 President Joanne Lamothe confirmed the workers were back on the job.

The Domtar mill began laying off workers at 8:30 p.m. Wednesday night in what they called a response to a shortage of trained staff.

"Domtar's Espanola mill recently experienced some absences in key positions which has resulted in the need to currently cease the pulp mill operations," said Domtar spokesperson Jan Martin in a statement to media.

"The paper section of the mill is operating normally at this time." Also in a news release, Unifor said the shutdown was necessary because a shortage of trained and qualified operators made it impossible to perform many operations safely.

"This temporary shutdown was a manpower issue, which has been resolved," Lamothe added.

They had all sorts of games like balloon animals, nerf guns, plinko, and I love KD and hotdogs, especially with ketchup.


The pool was packed with all of us playing in the water, but I wish I was big enough for the slide, maybe next year! There were over 200 kids there, and that doesn't count the



Recipe

A delicious family recipe. You can't go wrong with chocolate, peanut butter and whipped cream. Everyone will love it. It makes a large trifle which can be divided into smaller bowls and frozen for future use.



- 1 chocolate cake mix
- 1 package peanut butter chips
- 4¹/₄ cups cold milk, divided
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup whipping cream
- $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp vanilla

- 2 packages of instant chocolate pudding
- 1 large container of Cool Whip
- 4 Crispy Crunch bars, crumbled

Prepare and cook cake as directed on the box. Let cool. Combine the peanut butter chips, ¹/₄ cup of milk and cream in a pot. Cook and stir over low heat until the chips are melted. Remove from the heat and stir in the vanilla. Cool to room temperature. Make the pudding using the remaining milk, beating for 2 minutes. To assemble: Crumble half the cake into a large bowl. Layer $\frac{1}{2}$ the peanut butter sauce, $\frac{1}{2}$ the pudding, $\frac{1}{2}$ the cool whip and half the candy bars. Repeat the layers ending with the crumbled candy bars on top. Cover and refrigerate for 3 hours. Can be divided into 2 or 3 bowls to freeze portions.
