Possible Bone Marrow Donors Needed For Espanola Boy - Fundraisers Set To Help Family



In our last issue, we reported that an Espanola youngster is fighting cancer and there might be a need for the public to help donate bone marrow. Nine-year-old Blake Bond will need a bone marrow transplant in Toronto as part of his treatment.

His mother, Kayli, and sister, Haileigh, have undergone testing and are waiting for the results.

the nation wide database. Blake had rung the bell declaring himself cancer free for the last three years on his mom's birthday in January, but tests in mid-February showed he has been diagnosed with another type of cancer: AML, acute myeloid leukemia - a cancer of the blood and bone marrow.

If they are not Blake had been originally diagnosed with childhood acute lymphoblastic leukemia, ALL, a type of cancer in which the bone marrow makes too many immature lymphocytes (a type of white blood cell). Leukemia may affect red blood cells, white blood cells, and platelets.

At the age of 18, Malachi Love- Robinson of Palm Beach wanted to be a doctor. So he put on a white smock and draped a stethoscope around his neck and presto! He was a doctor. Gélinas was reacting to an announcement from Queen's Park last week that the province will fund a new PET/CT scanner in southern Ontario promising it would be operational in just months.

Memorial Ride To Honour Miner – A Granddaughter Remembers

Kathryn Pellarin of Massey is one proud grand-daughter, although she is not able to spend time with her grandfather like she used to. That is because he has passed on and it is her memories that keep him close to her.

"I'm very proud of my grandpa, Jim Hobbs. He worked extremely hard to provide for his family, both as a young kid and as an adult."

Her grandfather became a hero to many when his daughter, Pellarin's Aunt Janice Martell, who lives in Sudbury, shared his story with the world in what became known as the McIntyre Powder Project.

Martell has been working closely with the Ontario Network of Injured Workers Groups (ONIWG), which will be hosting a memorial cycling ride between Massey and Elliot Lake this May in tribute to Hobbs.

The veteran miner made that trip hundreds of times between 1978 and 1990 while working for the area's underground uranium mines.

When he retired, he was diagnosed with Parkinson's, a disease Martell attributes to his exposure to a finely ground aluminum dust known as McIntyre Powder.

That ONIWG is recognizing the significance of occupational disease on the province's workforce while honouring her father and other miners impacted by McIntyre Powder exposure.

"Seeing him become bed-ridden with Parkinson's and not be able to do the things he loved like fishing really took a toll on me, says Pellarin. "I had a very hard time going to visit him as I wanted to remember him as the strong man who put family first

and always took us grandkids fishing.

"His passing has had a huge effect on our family. I am extremely honoured to call him my grandfather and I know he was proud of all of us."

Established in 1991, ONIWG is a non-profit organization with 22 member groups advocating for workers who have been injured or become ill while on the job. The organization's annual cycling ride aims to raise awareness surrounding the challenges addressing injured workers, in addition to raising funds for its advocacy work. This is the first time the ride will travel to Northern Ontario.

To greet the riders, Martell is planning a welcoming reception on Friday, May 25 and Saturday, May 26 at the Lester B. Pearson Civic Centre in Elliot Lake.

It will also give her a chance to share with the general public the information she's learned over the last four years through the McIntyre Powder Project, which she started in 2014.

"In regards to the project, I am happy my Aunt has gone above and beyond to seek answers," says Pellarin. "But, seeing my grandpa's name constantly in the news is also upsetting. He was a very private man and I feel that sometimes this project puts so much emphasis on him that it feels like exploitation.

"However, the work my Aunt has done is extremely important and all the minors should be recognized, not just grandpa. He was not the only one who had to inhale the aluminum.

"I wish my grandfather could have received some answers before his passing, if it contributed to his Parkinson's, but unfortunately that is not the case. I hope he rests peacefully knowing he has a family who is very honoured by the sacrifices he made and I believe that ONIWG needs to reevaluate where it puts its funding and help get all miners answers."

First introduced in 1943, McIntyre Powder was introduced in the mines as a way of potentially reducing worker compensation costs associated with silicosis, a lung disease caused by inhaling silica dust. The theory was that if miners inhaled aluminum first, it would coat the lungs, protecting them from silicosis.

Aluminum was ground into a fine dust and miners were mandated to breathe it in while in the mine 'drys' at the start of every shift. 'Drys' is a mining term for change rooms. They got the name because these rooms are usually kept at an elevated temperature to facilitate drying clothing between work shifts.

Miners were not asked for their consent or warned of any possible side effects.

The practice was considered ineffective and using aluminum ceased in 1980. But years later, miners who had been exposed began experiencing a range of health issues, including everything from respiratory illness to neurological disease.

Martell believes McIntyre Powder is the direct cause, but because there is no scientific evidence correlating the dust with the range of illnesses, miners filing compensation claims with the Workplace Safety and Insurance Board (WSIB) have been denied.

She says that's unacceptable and in January, she pushed harder, filing a Freedom of Information Act request with the WSIB to release the information about its policy denying claims associated with aluminum exposure and neurological disease. In response, the WSIB quoted a cost for accessing that information at just under \$8,000, so Martell launched a crowdfunding campaign with GoFundMe to raise the funds, over \$5,000 so far.

Since teaming up with the Occupational Health Clinics for Ontario Workers (OHCOW) on a research project in 2016, Martell said a database of 450 workers has been compiled documenting their work histories and health records. Research is ongoing to find common elements among the cases to pinpoint any links or trends.

OHCOW is additionally conducting a first review of cases surrounding six specific respiratory diseases: lung cancer, silicosis, sarcoidosis, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), pulmonary fibrosis and asbestosis.

For now, any claims associated with neurological disorders such as Parkinson's disease, Alzheimer's or amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS) have been put on hold, as they require more research to determine any links to McIntyre Powder. Similarly, OHCOW researchers have found 45 cases of Parkinson's disease, or 10 per cent of cases, in the registry, while the Canadian average sits around 0.2 per cent. Meanwhile, Pellarin is considering taking part in the ride as well, but not by motorized power, rather by literally using horse power.

"I am considering attending the ride in his honour on my horse in it as he was always very proud to have a grand-daughter take up farming.

"I really hope that the data collection my aunt has done will contribute to research to get all the miners answers," she added. To contribute to the campaign, go to: www.gofundme.com/ mcintyre-powder-project



Espanola Police Reports

Credit Card Fraud, Identity Fraud - On February 13, 2018, Espanola Police commenced an investigation into the fraudulent use of a credit card. The victim involved had been contacted by the credit card company regarding an outstanding balance, but the card had been mailed to a previous address and the victim had never received the card. Investigation determined that the new occupant at the victim's previous residence had received the card in the mail and fraudulently activated the card, which she then used several times to obtain cash. The suspect was subsequently located and arrested on February 24th. As a result of the investigation, a 35 year old Espanola woman was charged with three counts of Fraudulent Use of a Credit Card, and one count of Identity Fraud. She will appear in Espanola court on April 9, 2018.

Under our current Business Plan 2016 - 2018 the Espanola Police Service is committed to increasing clearance rates for property crime offences through property identification programs and reducing the amount of property crime through community prevention and awareness programs.

Assault Causing Bodily Harm - On February 24th, 2018 at approximately 2:23 am, Espanola Police were called to attend a local licenced establishment regarding a complaint of an assault that had just occurred. Police and Paramedics attended the scene and the 25 year old male victim was transported to the Espanola Hospital for treatment of his injuries. Investigation determined that a 21 year old male had assaulted the victim, and immediately fled the scene. The suspect was later located and arrested.

As a result of the investigation, a 21 year old Espanola man was charged with Assault Causing Bodily Harm. He will appear in Espanola court on April 9th, 2018.

Under our current Business Plan 2016 - 2018 the Espanola Police Service is committed to maintaining a high level of enforcement and clearance rates for violent crimes, as well as assisting victims of violent crime.

Impaired Operation - On February 23, 2018 at approximately 4:57 pm, Espanola Police Service received a call from a concerned citizen, reporting an intoxicated male that was observed driving an Off Road Vehicle in the area of Anderson Lake. The plate number was provided for the vehicle, as well as a description and direction of travel, and Officers immediately began searching for the vehicle. The vehicle was located a short time later and investigation confirmed that the male driver was intoxicated. He was arrested and transported to the Police station for breath tests, which determined that the driver's blood alcohol concentration was almost three times the legal limit of 80 mg.

As a result of the investigation, a 57 year old Espanola man was charged with Impaired Operation of a Motor Vehicle and Operating a Motor Vehicle Over 80 mg. He will appear in Espanola court on April 9, 2018.

Under our current Business Plan 2016 - 2018 the Espanola Police Service is committed to promoting safe driving through enforcement strategies and public education. Information from concerned citizens is a valuable tool in ensuring road safety, and the Espanola Police encourage anyone with information on impaired driving or other road safety concerns to contact Police to report the information. Callers do not have to give their name if they wish to remain anonymous.

Council To Review Report On Fire Hall Costing

A report on the condition of the service. the Espanola Fire Hall was the focus of a committee of the whole meeting held on March 9th..

Council learned any restructuring, additions or changes to the hall would have to meet the standards for a post-disaster building as stipulated under provincial legislation.

Whether the fire hall is modified or a new one is built is estimated at around the same cost, \$2.8 million dollars.

A new fire pumper truck is expected to be coming soon and will not fit in the hall as it is, so council has to make a decision in the near future.

Espanola Fire Chief Mike says new legal Pichor will requirements mean changes to the fire hall to make room for the new truck, another necessity required by Pichor says a new truck is a

must and insurance grading for the community gives no credit to primary attack vehicles greater than 20 years. That means if the new truck is not purchased, ratepayers will be hit with higher premiums and that means higher taxes.

Both trucks now owned by the service will be over 20 years old next year.

As for the building itself, Pichor says stations are to be built to post disaster requirements as per the Ontario Building Code, but the hall was not.

Council is now reviewing a study of the requirements and costing.

A decision on expansion or a new build is expected to be made in the near future, but council had agreed to move ahead with a new truck.



Recipe

Our favourite office baker is sharing another "tested and approved" recipe with us. This is a simple to assemble, moist and delicious cake to make and

serve to family or guests. It can be served warm or cold with a dollop of whipped cream or a scoop of vanilla ice cream.

Caramel Apple Cake

• 3 eggs

- 1 ¹/₄ cup vegetable oil
- 1 tsp vanilla
- $2\frac{1}{2}$ cups flour
- 2 cups sugar
- 2 tsp baking powder
- 1 tsp salt
- 1 tsp baking soda
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- 4 medium tart apples, peeled and chopped (4 cups)
- 1 cup chopped pecans
- 1 package (11 oz) butterscotch chips
- Caramel sauce

Beat eggs, oil and vanilla together. Combine the next 6 ingredients and add to the egg mixture; mix well. Stir in the apples and pecans. The batter will be very thick. Put into an ungreased 9 x 13 baking pan. Sprinkle the top with the butterscotch chips. Bake at 325 degrees for 40 -45 minutes or until toothpick inserted comes out clean. (Check at 30 minutes). Cool in the pan. Drizzle with caramel sauce.
