Huron Central Railway Can Run Another Year



By Rosalind Russell - The rail line that accesses Nairn Centre, Espanola and Sault Ste. Marie will run for another year, thanks to funding from the upper governments.

In May 2018, Genesee & Wyoming Canada Inc. announced that without the necessary provincial funding to maintain its Huron Central Railway it would discontinue those operations by the end of 2018. As a result, a task force was created in an effort to secure the provincial funding needed to protect the jobs and economy of those relying heavily on this short line railway. The HCR runs from the City of Greater Sudbury through to Sault Ste Marie.

In mid-November, members of the Task Force were in attendance to hear Northern Ontario Heritage Fund Corp announce that funding will be granted to Genesee & Wyoming Canada Inc.

"The Town of Espanola is pleased with the announcement of \$980,000 in funding from the Heritage Fund to Huron Central



Espanola's new council will be dealing with the Integrity Commissioner's Report. Espanola council held a closed meeting on Monday, November 12th and decided to defer the motion in regards to imposing sanctions on four councillors to the next council. The Integrity Commissioner Shearer Parnega recommended four councillors: Ron Duplessis, Ken Duplessis, Heather Mallott and Ray Dufour, lose

a portion of their stipends for what she deemed abusive and intimidating behavior.

Mondav's Following meeting, council met for the regular meeting on Tuesday, November 13th and voted to rescind the motion to adopt what they called 'Council's New Vision', a plan to improve relations between council and staff.

They also made a motion to defer the plan to the new council for review.

House Burns For Third Time In Espanola -**Considered Suspicious**

The Espanola Volunteer Firefighters were called out to a house fire on the Queensway Avenue in Espanola, which has been deemed suspicious.

The fire, which was called in around 12:20am Wednesday morning, November 7th at 41 Queensway Avenue was put out quickly, but since it is the third one at the site in the last few months. the Ontario Provincial Police Criminal Investigations Unit and the Ontario Fire Marshall's Office have been called in.

The first fire in September was deemed accidental, but police are still looking for information about the second blaze a few weeks later, which is believed to have been deliberately set.

This third fire is deemed suspicious.

The home is cordoned off while James Allen of the Ontario Fire Marshall's Office completes his forensic investigation.

Railway. This will support the continued operations of the Huron Central Railway and allow it to operate in a safe

manner for approximately one year. The Province has indicated it is committed to keeping this critical piece of infrastructure and this funding will allow

the time required to develop a comprehensive long-term plan to address the viability of this stretch of rail. Ross Romano the MPP for Sault Ste Marie said the government is committed to developing a long-term solution. It's very refreshing to see a Provincial government that is taking the support of Northern Ontario economic interests very seriously. We sincerely thank the Province for their

commitment to the economic interests of Northern Ontario.

A long-term solution is required to allow the railway to remain in business and this is very important for the companies that rely on the rail service. The loss of this service significantly

affects the economics of the plants and certainty in rail service is very important in capital investment decisions." stated Bill Foster, Deputy Mayor.

Meanwhile, NDP MPP Michael Mantha says the investment in the Huron Central short line railway is welcome with government pledging six-figure amounts, but he emphasizes a long-term solution is needed to protect thousands of jobs, largely in the steel industry.

Every dollar for Huron Central is welcome, said Mantha, who is also the NDP's critic for Northern Development and Mines.

However, Mantha says the rail needs a stable solution that makes sure the Huron Central runs for the long-term.

The funding will allow Huron Central Railway to run between Sudbury and Sault Ste. Marie, moving products including steel and timber from Algoma, Eacom Timber and Domtar for at least a year.



Recipe

It's that time of year when it's nice to have a casserole to throw in the oven and this is a good one. It comes I highly recommended. You can use any chicken pieces



that you wish. Bone-in, skinless chicken is a good choice because the bone keeps the chicken moist.

Chicken Rosemary Casserole

- $2\frac{1}{2}$ lbs of chicken
- 1 cup of long grain rice (not instant)
- 3 garlic cloves
- $2\frac{1}{2}$ cups chicken broth
- ¹/₄ cup of mayonnaise or miracle whip •
- $\frac{1}{4}$ cup bread crumbs
- 1 tsp salt
- 1 tsp rosemary

- 2 tbsp lemon juice
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup parmesan cheese

Butter or spray a 9 x 13 pan. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Pour rice into dish. Mince garlic over the rice. Pour in the chicken broth and stir in the rosemary, salt and lemon juice. Place the chicken on the rice. Spread the mayonnaise on top of the chicken pieces and sprinkle on the bread crumbs Bake 1 1/4 hour uncovered. Sprinkle top with $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of parmesan cheese.
