Cannabis Now Legal – Councils Have Some Time To Make A Decision



By Rosalind Russell - When new municipal councils are sworn in, they will have to decide whether cannabis storefronts will be part of their local landscape.

As of Wednesday, October 17th, 2018, cannabis use becomes legal in Canada. In Ontario, it is only available by ordering online and that will remain in place until April 2019.

Ontario Premier, Doug Ford, reversed the previous model of a licensing model similar to the LCBO.

Under the previous model, councils had until January to decide on whether to allow it in their municipality or not.


The police had no clue as to Stoller's whereabouts claiming that, since so much time had passed, the man could be on any incontinent ... sorry, on any continent in the world.



Police Unsuccessful In Finding A Suspect

The Espanola OPP took over policing in Espanola on Thursday night and were in action by early Friday morning looking for a robbery suspect.

However, the Espanola OPP canine unit and special officers were unsuccessful in finding a suspect.

Officers from the Espanola detachment responded to a theft in progress at a business on Panache Lake Road in Espanola on Friday October 12th at around 8:00am.

OPP Constable Peter Crouse says they did not want people walking their dogs or hunting in the immediate local area while the search for the suspect was going on. He adds, they were not looking for a missing person and the Espanola search had no connection with the one on Manitoulin Island for a missing teen.

With the assistance of the OPP Emergency Response Team and the OPP Canine Unit, officers made attempts to locate the suspect, but no individuals were found.

The damage to the building and theft are estimated to be over \$5,000.

Access to Penage Lake Road was re-opened Friday night.

OPP are asking that any person with information to call OPP or Crimestoppers and the investigation is continuing.

EXCESSIVE SPEED RESULTS IN SEVEN DAY IMPOUND - (ESPANOLA, ON) - On Thursday, October 11, 2018, an officer from the Manitoulin-Espanola Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) was conducting traffic enforcement on Highway 17 in Sables Spanish-Rivers Township, Ontario.

At approximately 11:21 p.m., the officer observed a traffic violation and conducted a stop. As a result of the investigation Jeffrey GUITARD, age 36 from Sudbury, Ontario has been charged with:

• Race a Motor Vehicle - Excessive Speed, contrary to section 172(1) of the Highway Traffic Act.

The accused's driver's licence has been suspended and the vehicle impounded for a period of seven days. He is scheduled to appear before the Ontario Court of Justice in Espanola, Ontario on November 29, 2018.

Manitoulin-Espanola OPP would like to remind drivers that excessive speed is one of the most serious and reckless forms of aggressive driving, and it puts everyone on the road at serious risk of injury or death.

DRIVER CHARGED WITH IMPAIRED BY DRUG - (ESPANOLA, ON) - On Saturday, October 6, 2018, officers from the Manitoulin-Espanola Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police were conducting Reduce Impaired Driving Everywhere (R.I.D.E.) checks at Lee Valley Road and Government Road in Sables-Spanish Rivers Township, Ontario.

At approximately 10:54 p.m., officers checked a passenger vehicle and observed the female driver exhibit signs of impairment. As a result of the investigation, Mitz TOULOUSE, age 43 from Sagamok Anishnawbek First Nation, Ontario has been charged with:

- Driving While Under Suspension, contrary to section 53(1) of the Highway Traffic Act; and with
- Driving While Ability Impaired Motor Vehicle (Drug), contrary to section 253(1)(a) of the Criminal Code.

The accused is scheduled to appear before the Ontario Court of Justice in Espanola, Ontario on December 3, 2018.

The Manitoulin-Espanola OPP would like to remind the public that a charge of impairment by drugs involves all drugs, be it prescription, over-the-counter and those that are illegal. Espanola Police Service Gone - Espanola OPP Renovations Underway

The sign marking the site of the Espanola Police Service has been taken down and the OPP are not wasting time in renovating the downtown building.

On Thursday night, at six p.m. October 11th, the Espanola Police Service ceased to exist. The sign was removed within minutes and OPP transition staff was handed over the keys to begin the renovation process, since the station will become a satellite office for the Espanola OPP.

The facility will undergo renovations between October 11th and November 9th and is closed for that period of time. Under the transition agreement, Espanola taxpayers will pay for the renovations, not only on Centre Street, but also at the main detachment in McKerrow.

Staff has also been put into

place. Staff Sargeant Kevin Webb left the detachment in early October to oversee the Sudbury Detachment, so a new detachment commander has been put in place. The new Acting Operations Manager is Acting Staff Sgt. Wayne Minnear and Inspector Baldassare Nuccio is the current Detachment Commander.

Anyone needing assistance can either go to the detachment on Highway 17, call 705-869-1211 or 911 in an emergency. Still with the story, arbitration is underway and as of press time, there was no release as to what arbitration entails for the former staff of the now defunct Espanola Police Service. And, there is still no confirmation as to the former EPS officers who are being transferred to the new OPP.

"council had some discussions on it, but when Ford changed the model, the discussion ended."

She adds it will be one of the high priority items for the new council to deal with.

Meanwhile, Glenda Massicotte of the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers says, "Municipalities need to hear from rate payers regarding this. Council is responsible for making the decision to accept or opt out by January. I am all for boosting the economy in our municipality by any legal resources."

Local area councils had preliminary discussions, but since the government has changed the model to favouring private store sales, municipalities will now decide whether storefronts will be established in their own communities.

Rainbow District School Board Adopts Mental Health Strategic Plan people.



Rainbow District School Board adopted its first Mental Health Strategic Plan.

The plan, which was carried unanimously, will guide the board's work over the next three years.

It aligns with the Board's Strategic Directions, creating a learning environment where young people become strong and healthy individuals, without discrimination.

In presenting the plan, Mental Health Lead Mary Jago shared some statistics; as many as one in five children and youth in Ontario experience some form of mental health problem at any given time.

Fewer than one in six receive the specialized treatment services they require.

Suicide accounts for 24 per cent of all deaths among young

"Mental health and well-being are fundamental to student achievement," said Rainbow District School Board Chair Doreen Dewar. "We have made strides in increasing awareness, reducing the stigma, and building a supportive culture. The Mental Health Strategic Plan will ensure that we continue to be responsive and progressive."

"According to Public Health Ontario, the impact of mental health, mental illness and addictions in Ontario on life expectancy, quality of life, and health care utilization is more than 1.5 times that of all cancers and more than seven times that of all infectious diseases," Jago added. "We need to stem the tide by creating the organizational conditions required successfully communicate and deliver evidence-based programs that promote resiliency and wellness.'

Through the annual campaign, the association aims to raise awareness of "three basic, but essential steps to take to reduce the likelihood of having a fire."


Those steps are:

LOOK for possible fire hazards in your home and eliminate them.

smoke alarms. Know that you may have only minutes to get out if a fire breaks out.

LEARN two ways out of each room of your home. Exits should be easy to access and free of clutter. After leaving the home, go to your family's designated meeting spot, established when you set up a home fire escape plan.



This recipe comes from our favourite office baker's great- great aunt. We enjoyed them at work last week slathered with butter and homemade jam. The

secret to tender scones is to not handle the dough too much or overwork it. Keep it quick and simple. They are melt in your mouth delicious, and are perfect served with a hot cup of coffee or tea. I can't wait to serve them for breakfast next time I have overnight guests.



Raisin Sugar Scones

- 2 ½ cups of flour
- 3/4 cup white sugar
- ½ tsp salt
- 4 tsp baking powder
- 2/3 cup shortening or butter (Doreen uses butter)
- 1 cup of raisins (soaked in warm water for 15 minutes)
- 1 egg lightly beaten- with enough milk to make 1 cup
- Sugar for sprinkling

Sift dry ingredients together, cut in shortening or butter until fine and crumbly. Drain the water from the raisins and add to the dry ingredients. Stir in the egg/milk mixture with a fork until the dry ingredients are moistened. Turn mixture onto a floured surface and pat to ½ inch thick. Cut into diamond shapes or use a round cookie cutter. Place scones on a parchment lined cookie sheet. Sprinkle lightly with white sugar. Bake at 425 degrees in oven for 12-15 minutes. Serve warm or cold. May be reheated for later use.


