Espanola Police Arbitration Settlement

By Rosalind Russell - An arbitrator has settled the contract and severance packages for former members of the Espanola Police Service Association.

Espanola Police Service Board Chair, Mary-Lou Mick, says the arbitrator has ordered the board to increase the severance from four weeks to five weeks for every year of service by a former member of the service who have not been hired by the Ontario Provincial Police.

She adds the arbitrator also

awarded a 1.7% increase in wages for 2017 and 2018 and letters of employment must be provided to all members.

Association president, Ed Stortz, says only four officers have been hired by the OPP.

He adds civilian employees are entitled to six weeks severance for each year of service.

He had no other comments to make in regards to the arbitration process.

OPP took over policing in Espanola on October 11th.

Espanola Therapeutic Park To Be Constructed In 2019

Espanola's Therapeutic Park for the long-term care wing of the Espanola Regional Hospital and Health Centre will be built in the Spring of 2019.

Foundation coordinator, Terri Noble, says they had a few setbacks over the summer due to wait times for an electrical engineer to provide electrical specs.

She adds they also needed engineering plans for the gazebos and other building structures.

All the drawings have now been submitted for a building permit and the plan is to line up the contractors and purchase supplies over the winter.

Noble adds construction will begin in early Spring 2019 and it will take four to six weeks to complete the project.

by the ringing of the bells 100 times at the Anglican Church on

Remembrance Day.

The Espanola Royal Canadian Legion Branch #39 is leading the local initiative.

On November 11th, at the going down of the sun, communities across Canada will emulate the moment in 1918 when church bells across Europe tolled as four years of war came to an end.

Still with the story, the Legion has also contacted all the schools for students to enter the annual poster and poetry contests.

Last year, 89 students from the local schools entered the contest with some entries going on to district and zone competitions. This year is the 100th anniversary of the Signing of The Armistice that ended the First World War. Ceremonies are all set for Legions in the North Shore corridor for Sunday, November 11th.

Meanwhile, the Espanola Sea Cadets and other volunteers joined members of the Royal Canadian Legion Branch #39 for the launch of the Poppy Campaign.

The Poppy Flag was officially raised at the municipal town office on Friday, October 26th.

Poppies will be on sale throughout the town with funds raised going to local veterans and their families and related programs.

There are plenty of women voices on councils in Espanola and across the North Shore.

Jill Beer is Espanola's new mayor, joined by incumbents Heather Mallot, Ray Dufour, Bill Foster and Ken Duplessis.

Also at the council table will be newcomers Sandra Havden and Maureen Van Alstine.

Long-time Baldwin Township councillor, Tex MacDonald is out, losing to newcomer, Joanne Boucher, who came in with enough votes to be named deputy mayor working with acclaimed Mayor Vern Gorham.

David Fairbairn, Ray Maltais and Bert McDowell will round council. The Town of Spanish will also see a woman lead over the next four years.

Jocelyne Bishop took out incumbent Ted Clague.

She will be joined by four councilors, all women: new deputy mayor, Karen Von Pickartz, as well as Debra Joncas, Sandra Trudel and Mary-Louise Zarichney.

School board trustees elected in local area

Do not use masks. Masks make it hard for children to see what's around them, including cars. Try a hypoallergenic (less likely to cause an allergic reaction), nontoxic make-up kit instead.

Make or buy costumes in light-coloured material.

Place strips of reflective tape on the back and front of costumes, so that drivers can better see your child.

Costumes should fit properly to prevent trips and falls. Avoid items such as oversized shoes, high heels, long dresses and long capes.

Dress your child for the weather. Add layers if needed.

Put your child's name, address and phone number on his costume.

Children under 10 should be accompanied by an adult for trick or treating. By the age of 10, some children are ready to go trick-or-treating with a group of friends.

Keep in mind that gum and hard candy can pose a choking risk for young children. Remove make-up before bedtime to prevent possible skin and eye irritation.

HALLOWEEN SAFETY TIPS

If your child is going out without an adult:

Make sure your child is in a group of at least 3 people.

Give them a flashlight. A cell phone is also a good idea if you have one.

Discuss in advance the route they should follow. Ask them to call you if they plan to go on a street that isn't on the route.

Set a curfew (and make sure they have a watch with them).

Tell your children not to eat anything until they get home.

Carry a white bag or pillowcase for your candy, and add some reflective tape.

Bring a cell phone, in case you need to make an emergency phone call.

Always travel in groups. Be sure there are at least 3 of you at all times.

Let your parents know where you're going to be at all times.

Don't visit houses that are not well lit.

Never go inside a stranger's house. Use the sidewalk whenever possible. If there's no sidewalk, walk on the side of the road facing traffic.

Don't criss-cross back and forth across the street. Work your way up one side of the street, and then start on the other. If you have any allergies, tell the person who is giving out the treats.

Don't eat any of your treats before you get home. Once home, ask your parents to look through your treats with you to make sure everything is okay.

For homeowners:

Turn on outdoor lights, and replace burnt-out bulbs.

Remove items from your yard or porch that might trip a child.

Sweep wet leaves from your steps and driveway.

Use alternative to candles in your pumpkins, such as a flashlight or a battery-operated candle.

Remember that some children have food allergies. Consider giving treats other than candy, such as stickers, erasers or a yo-yo.

SPOOKY SNACK - EASY RITZ CRACKER SPIDERS

A fun Halloween snack that your kids will love in their lunches or as a snack at home.

- Ritz Crackers
- Pretzel Sticks
- Peanut Butter, Cheese Whiz, Cream Cheese (whichever your child prefers)
- Tiny tube of white icing
- · Mini Chocolate Chips



Cut the pretzel sticks in half. Spread some peanut butter (or Cheese Whiz, cream cheese) onto the cracker. It needs to be thick enough to hold the legs in place, so be generous with it. Arrange 4 pretzel stick halves, on each side of the cracker, pushing them into the peanut butter to make the spiders legs. Spread a generous amount of peanut butter on the other cracker and place it over top. On the top of the cracker, use the tube of icing to make two dots and then gently push the pointy side of the mini chocolate chips into the icing to make the eyes.

FLUFFY PUMPKIN SLIME RECIPE FOR KIDS

- 1/2 Cup Elmer's White Glue
- · Unscented Shaving Cream
- Orange Food Colouring
- · Contact Saline Solution
- Baking Soda
- Mason Jar
- · Black Construction Paper
- Scissors
- · Pumpkin Scented Oil (optional)



Add 1/2 cup of Elmer's white school glue and 4 cups of shaving cream to a bowl. Mix well and slowly add in drops of orange food colouring, stirring well until you get the desired colour of orange you'd like. Optional: You can add in a few drops of pumpkin scented oil after you mix in the food coloring. Next stir in 1/4 tsp of baking soda. Then add contact solution about 1 Tablespoon at a time and mix. Keep adding a little more contact solution and mixing until your slime begins forming into a ball-like form as you mix. You'll notice this is when it starts to turn into slime and becomes less sticky. It will begin coming off the sides of your container and sticking together. If your slime is still sticky add some more saline solution by starting small and adding a little as you go and continue to knead it. The slime will take on a fluffy marshmallowy consistency.

When you're finished you'll want to store your slime in an air tight container. Or have the kids create their own jack-o-lantern jars by cutting out the faces from black construction paper and using some Elmer's glue to glue their faces to the mason jars. This is a fun family activity or perfect for Halloween parties.

- Green paper and construction paper
- •Dried lentils
- •Craft foam (meat trays, construction paper)


