# Thrill-Seeking, Selfie-Takers, High-Wire Halfwits And More

So I'm looking at this photograph in the the human gene pool" and thereby making "Life Section" of the Toronto Star of a 19-year-old kid hanging on for dear life at the end of a steel beam that juts out from a crumbling railway trestle - about 300 feet above the ground. No sign of the person with a gun who forced him to go out on this heavy steel limb, just a young man whose hands and finger nails are the only things keeping him from falling into the forest below and certain death.

As it turns out this kid, whose Instagram user name is abu dahbi, is not in the deaththreating predicament because someone forced him out there at gun point. No, he climbed out on this beam hand-over-hand in order to get a selfie of himself clinging to the edge of self-extinction. He's intentionally attempting to defy death. He's a thrill seeker. Sadly he's not alone. Ever since the first selfie taken from Washington's Vance Creek Bridge went viral, young (and I'm being generous in using this word) people have arrived from France, Germany, England and Australia to do Yoga, push-ups, pull-ups and all manner of poses on this abandoned wooden trestle in the foothills of Mount Olympia.

This dilapidated overpass is the second tallest railway bridge in America and a mecca for morons who want to be famous for carrying off a stunt so inane and dangerous it would normally warrant a Darwin Award. But because they lived, they're ineligible. The Darwin Awards claim that those who perish while executing a really stupid stunt are actually "removing themselves from

# Arson Incidents – Request For Public Assistance

On the 17th and 18th of September 2018 Espanola Fire Department have responded to three separate fire incidents that were determined to be the result of arson, and are seeking the assistance of the public to help solve these crimes.

The first fire incident occurred at the Espanola Recreation complex on September 17th at approximately 4:41 am. The fire was set in a wooden garbage dumpster in the area of the track and field, and resulted in a large fire that destroyed the dumpster.

The second fire incident occurred on September 18th at approximately 12:51 am at a residence on Queensway Avenue. The residence had previously been damaged by an accidental fire on September 2nd, 2018, and was again set on fire by the suspect. An Officer was on patrol and observed the fire, and the fire was quickly extinguished. The third fire incident occurred again on September 18th at approximately 11:46 pm. This fire occurred in the new construction project off Queensway Avenue, and was once again determined to be the result of arson. The fire was observed by residents and was quickly extinguished.

The Espanola Police Service is requesting that anyone with

information relating to any or all of these arson incidents contact the Espanola Police at (705) 869-3251. Tipsters remain 100% anonymous and could be eligible for a cash reward of up to \$2,000.

## High School Violence - Espanola And Manitoulin - Leads To Lock And Secure At Espanola Schools

*By Rosalind Russell* - It all started on Friday, September 14th when an altercation between two students at Manitoulin Secondary School escalated into what is now being called a brawl. Manitoulin OPP says on the Friday around noon, they responded to a disturbance at Manitoulin Secondary School.

A 15-year-old youth from M'Chigeeng First Nation has been charged with uttering threats to cause death or bodily harm and assault.

The youth, who cannot be identified under the Youth Criminal Justice Act, is to appear in Gore Bay Youth Court on September 26th.

Then, the following Monday, Espanola High School was put on lockdown for about an hour and a half, and all five schools were put on hold and secure for the majority of the day, until around 1:30pm.

Espanola Police Sergeant Bill Lamore says police were at all five Espanola schools during a hold and secure, which is where the exterior doors are locked and monitored by a teacher, but people are free to come and go.

He says that Monday morning, police received information that Facebook posts were circulating about a potential threat to a high school, and as a result, all five schools in the Espanola area implemented the "hold and secure" until early afternoon.

Lamour adds the OPP and service worked together to track the origin of the threat,

which suggested that a "drive by shooting" at either the Espanola High School or Manitoulin Secondary School might occur, following the incident at Manitoulin High the Friday before.

Lamour says police talked to an individual who admitted to telling friends rumours that had no valid basis and police determined that there was no specific threat to conduct a "drive by shooting" at either of the two schools.

Then, on Tuesday, September 18th, additional charges against several people were laid involving the brawl at Manitoulin Secondary School.

The difference of opinion between two students had escalated along what many call racial lines and the brawl broke out in the parking lot.

Several students fled and told their parents, many of them whom were from M'Chigeeng.

As a result, several parents showed up and now several people are facing charges, so far all from M'Chigeeng First Nation: a 38 year-old woman, 16-year old and 17-year old youth have all been charged with assault; a 14 year-old female with uttering threats and assault and a 13 year-old youth with assault with a weapon and possession of a dangerous weapon.

They are to appear in Gore Bay court on October 31st.

More charges may be laid.

The investigation is ongoing and anyone with information is asked to call OPP.

### Talks Fail Between Town Of Espanola And Espanola Police Service Association

Bv Rosalind Russell - The members of the Espanola Police Service Association will have to go to arbitration following a breakdown in talks. Espanola Police Association President, Constable Ed Stortz. says the police association and the town (police board) met earlier this month to discuss a number of issues related to the impending disbanding of the police service and a contract since the members have been without one since December 2016.

Stortz says mediation talks started out with the best

intention of coming to an agreement but with no success and mediation ended.

That has now forced the two sides into arbitration talks on September 24th.

The severance packages are high priority since the Espanola Police Service will be officially disbanded by October 11th and will be paid out by the municipality.

The terminations affect 20 people; the chief, 11 officers, dispatchers and a full-time court clerk.

There has been no comment by town officials/negotiators.

# Espanola Mayor Apologizes To Staff And Council – Integrity Commissioner Report

Espanola Mayor Ron Piche named in the report: Ray apologized to staff and council Dufour, Heather Mallot, at the regular meeting. Ken Duplessis and Ron

Piche was cited in a recent Integrity Commissioner report as not maintaining control over council and being abrasive and rude with his commentary at times.

Piche says he apologized at Tuesday's council meeting for the code of conduct violations to the staff and the disrespectful tone he used towards council at meetings during his term.

He also acknowledges that he failed to observe order and decorum at the meetings, but adds he has investigated what his responsibilities and rights are as a mayor and promises better control.

named in the report: Ray Dufour, Heather Mallot, Ken Duplessis and Ron Duplessis, did not take part in the investigation, have made no comment, and have not responded to a request for comment either.

The Integrity Commissioner, Shearer Parnega, wrote a very critical review of Espanola council's behaviour saying the elected politicians harassed, undermined and were abusive to municipal employees.

The case came to a head this year when nine department heads decided to complain to the Integrity Commission over how council treated them. Once the complaints were made, that triggered a Code of Conduct investigation.

Recipe



Thank you to one of our out of town customers/readers for the following recipe. She tells us these muffins

are delicious and ALMOST guilt free. Chocolate and peanut butter is my absolute favourite combination and I'm anxious to bake and try these muffins this weekend. I appreciate her for taking the time to bring the recipe in and for sharing i with all of us.

### Healthy Double Chocolate and Peanut Butter Muffins

- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup cocoa powder
- 2 tbsp oat flour or all-purpose flour
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> tsp baking soda
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> tsp baking powder
- $\frac{1}{2}$  tsp salt
- 2 tbsp brown sugar, lightly packed
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup creamy peanut butter
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup unsweetened apple sauce
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup vanilla Greek yogurt
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 2 tbsp honey
- 1 large egg
- 5 tbsp dark chocolate chips

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Spray muffin tins (do not use liners). Stir together cocoa, flour, baking soda, salt and brown sugar. In a separate bowl combine peanut butter, apple sauce, greek yogurt, vanilla and honey. Beat until completely combined. Mix together the dry and wet ingredients until just combined and then add the egg, don't overmix. Stir in the chocolate chips. Pour the batter into the muffin tins and top each muffin with additional chocolate chips. Bake 18- 22 minutes or until a toothpick comes out clean.
