Extra Funding Dollars For Espanola

By Rosalind Russell - There could be almost a million dollars in additional funding in the Town of Espanola's municipal budget. Council was pleasantly surprised when Deputy Mayor Bill Foster informed them March 26th that there are dollars available for grants from both the federal and provincial governments, but it depends on how the money is spent. The Ford government is providing up to \$637,000 in funding for service delivery and related programming and the federal Liberals are providing access to \$330,000 for infrastructure projects. That's good news for council, but Town CAO, Cynthia Townsends says the criteria will be reviewed and there are some options available, which will be discussed as part of the ongoing budget process.

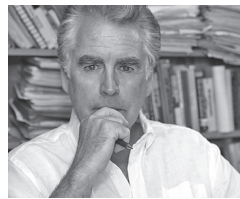

"Well there were hundreds of us cowboys there, all puffed and powdered and scrubbed for good to go to town. Then it all went quiet."

"So quiet, I bet you could hear a flea fart."

"Then they called my name and I just sat there dazed as a dumb cow dog comin' outta the wrong gate."

"A petrified cowboy poet."

"Finally I found my wits and galloped on stage like a mare running for the barnyard to get her morning oats."

"Lots of cheerin' and slumguzzling goin'

on?"

"Noise! It was like a bunch of bulls finally figured out where them prairie oysters came from."

"Now did Ol' Will present that there prize hisself?"

"No, ya tinhorn. Will Rogers is deader than Trigger but not nearly as stuffed."

"Well it mustabin' like a real kick in the butt by a buckin' bronco all the same."

"Surprised? I was so surprised the snake skin on my cowboy boots started crawlin' off the stage."

"So how's it feel to be the greatest cowboy poet on this here planet's prairie?"

"Great. Now I get to wear all my cowboy duds and don't have to do none of the work."

"You must be higher than a buzzard trying to fly over a sandstorm."

"Winnin' that Will Rogers award ... well I'll tell ya, I'm just as happy as a short cow in long grass."

"Happier than a dog mostly stickin' out the passenger window?"

"I am udderly tickled."

"Do they call you Miss Doris down in Texas?"

"Well yes they do but you know at my age, I haven't missed much."

"Any money come with the award?"

"Are you kiddin'? Anything that I make from poetry goes into my Mistletoe account. I just kiss that money goodbye."

"Any gifts?"

"No, but they named a mule after me down there. She's called the Daley Grind 'cause she's got long legs, a good rear end and she's so stubborn her husband's name is Alright Already."

"Well, as the barbwire said to the staple gun – keep me posted."

"Don't take any wooden nickels, and don't poke a pig in the eye with a pointy stick."

With that one Doris hung up. Doris Daley lives in Sheep River, Alberta with her husband Al who's also a cowboy poet. Whether hiking the Rockies or driving the U.S. poetry circuit these two are happier than two ticks on the bum of a burro.

Carol Hughes' Column - Unpacking The Federal Budget

The political theatre that overshadowed the delivery of the budget may have helped insulate the government from a more complete reaction to what has been described as an unfocused attempt to shore up support without allocating enough resources to move important issues toward resolution. Lost in the commotion was the fact that this is a disappointing budget for Canadians who need help right now to make ends meet.

For Northern Ontario there are few specifics but what jumps off the page is the tiny sum of \$6 million allocated to our regional development agency, FedNor. If the government were pulling back on investments through these agencies entirely it might not stick out, but the Atlantic and Northern agencies received \$67 million and \$95 million respectively. It begs the question, does the government have a vision when it comes to developing Northern Ontario's economy? What is welcome is the money set aside for forestry, but the details of that aren't spelled out and it remains to be seen exactly how much Northern Ontario will see.

Underfunding is a common theme on issues that will make a difference to First Nations. There is less money for Jordan's Principle than what the experts deemed was necessary. The money set aside for on-reserve water infrastructure the investment over the next five years doesn't come anywhere near the \$2.5 billion the Parliamentary Budget officer said was needed to modernize and repair this critical infrastructure. There's no new core funding for on-reserve primary and secondary education and no new funding for on-reserve housing, despite urgent needs and enormous backlogs for repair, construction, or mould detection and remediation.

Some of the headlines this week made it seem that seniors on the Guaranteed Income Supplement

will be allowed to work without a financial penalty, but that isn't entirely true. The benchmark for claw-backs has gone up, but there will still be claw-backs and it doesn't address the bigger problem which is that so many seniors are struggling in retirement. The same can be said for the increase in GIS top up payments which could be as much as \$80 a month. It's a start, but the government could have done much better. In the last campaign, New Democrats proposed an increase that would have lifted 200,000 seniors out of poverty with a more robust GIS. According to projections in the budget, the government's increase will help about a quarter that number.

Infrastructure remains a priority for many Canadians and there is money in this budget that will not be parsed through the Infrastructure Bank, which is welcome news. A former assistant to the Parliamentary Budget Officer remains concerned however, that infrastructure spending has been relatively haphazard and mostly driven by political expediency. He says the government still hasn't created a national infrastructure program, or clearly defined why they are spending in any region or on specific projects.

Perhaps the biggest disappointment was that there was nothing to move us toward a universal publicly delivered pharmacare program in the budget. Even Conservatives are agreeing with New Democrats that what was included in the budget will not deliver on pharmacare. That money is only going to create an agency that will replace the current two agencies in approving drugs and their pricing. Pharmacare has the potential to transform the lives of millions of Canadians who struggle to afford the medication they need. What is clear from the budget, is that those who struggle will continue do so.

Ford Government Must Ensure Wood Supply Access For Northern Mills, Forestry Jobs: NDP

QUEEN'S PARK — During question period on Tuesday, NDP Northern Development critic Michael Mantha said the Ford government must ensure access to wood supply for northern mills and forestry operations, to support the hundreds of jobs that depend on them.

Mantha said the future of one mill in Fort Frances is in jeopardy, and another mill in Thessalon is cutting jobs because the Ford government is failing to allocate wood supply. "Your government controls the wood rights on crown lands. It also has the legal obligation to involve First Nation communities in meaningful consultations, but like the Liberals, this government is sitting on its hands instead of taking action," said Mantha, MPP for Algoma-Manitoulin, during question period in the legislature.

"A company wants to use wood from the Crossroute Forest to bring back forestry jobs to Fort Frances. The town contends another company is transferring Crown fibre from the Crossroute Forest to its other operations in northwestern Ontario, contrary to the terms in the Sustainable Forest License agreement.

"And just last week a 30 per cent workforce reduction was announced at Midway Lumber in Thessalon.

"Will this government tell the families from Fort Frances, Thessalon and across the North, that it will ensure that mills and forestry operations have the wood they need to operate and support the hundreds of direct and indirect jobs that depend on them?"

Mantha said that over the last 15 years, mills and forestry operations have closed all over Northwestern Ontario. That includes at least five in Thunder Bay, two in Dryden, two in Kenora, one in Sioux Lookout and one in Fort Frances.

"Those closures came with devastating job losses that hurt thousands of families," Mantha said.

Mantha reminded the Ford government that in 2014 when the PCs were in opposition, they supported wood allocation to reopen the Fort Frances mill — only to reverse position now and fail to come to the table.

Recipe

In last week's column I shared a recipe with you for WOW Brownies; one of the best brownies I've ever tasted! This week's cheesecake recipe uses that brownie as its base, but I'm sure if you have a favourite brownie recipe, it can be also used. I'll be honest and tell you that I haven't tried this recipe but it comes highly recommended by our favourite office baker and she knows her desserts!



No Bake Brownie Cheesecake

- ½ WOW Brownie recipe (last week's column)
- 16 oz cream cheese (2 boxes), room temperature
- ½ cup of sugar
- 2 tsp vanilla
- 1 cup of whipping cream
- 1 ½ cups chocolate, semi-sweet or dark



To make the brownie base, make a ½ recipe of the Wow Brownie recipe from last week's column (or your favourite brownie recipe). That will give you a thick enough layer for your cheesecake. Pour into a buttered 9 inch spring form pan. Bake at 350 degrees for approximately 35-40 minutes or until firm to touch. Set aside to cool slightly.

For the cheesecake filling, melt the chocolate in the microwave or in a double boiler and set aside to cool. Beat the cream cheese, sugar and vanilla with a mixer on medium speed until there aren't any lumps. Gradually add in the cream and continue whipping until really thick. Add in the chocolate and mix. Spoon into your prepared tin on top of the brownie. Refrigerate until firm. This will take around 4 hours. You can decorate it with a chocolate ganache or with whipped cream if desired.
