I was eight years old and Mrs. Armstrong, one of my mom's best friends, asked if she could take me to Massey for the fair. She loved my paintings and I had done a fair size painting of the NBC Peacock in all its bright vivid colours as only an eight-yearold kid can.

So, off we went, it was all hustle and bustle registering because Mrs. Armstrong had like what seemed a hundred entries for cooking, pickling, quilting, sewing and so much more. A very talented lady, she also introduced me to liquid embroidery and had plenty of that on hand as well.

Registration done, it was time to help her set up the booth to sell her products that were not part of the exhibit competitions. I was so excited, especially with the Ferris

wheel, which I had never seen before. My mother had given me a new two-dollar bill

and I could spend it on what I wanted. The ride was only ten cents ... Wow, that was lots of money to spend back then! You could buy three black gum for a penny, but that wheel called me and I decided to go for it much to my regret. Unfortunately I discovered my life-long dislike for anything that spins or rolls. I'm the grandma who now holds everything for children to indulge in the rides.

But, the fair had plenty of other fascinations to hold for a brighteyed girl. There were games of chance, I lost, but did buy myself a little corn doll, hand-made and so precious. She lasted many years, but being made of husks and rough play, had to be finally set aside.

Now, Friday morning, the exhibitors were the only ones who were allowed near the exhibit halls. There was another hall way back when, but I can't remember what it was called. What I do remember is the two men, in their three-piece suits, and a lady, dressed as a pioneer woman, bonnet and all, looking at all the exhibits. A young woman walked quickly behind them with a big box and the judges would stop and ask her for a specific colour. There was a tiny space to write down what category the ribbon was for.

I was still not aware of what the ribbons meant. I simply noticed that Mrs. Armstrong's carrots, zucchini, embroidered pillow cases, quilts and MY painting all got a blue ribbon.

I ran back to tell Mrs. Armstrong and she laughed out loud and grabbed me up in her arms for a big hug.

She said she knew I could do it and I had so much talent that I did not know I had and would be able to discover. She was more proud of me winning the blue ribbon, which meant I was the best in that category, than all her ribbons.

The rest of the weekend was a whirlwind of cows and calves, pony rides, horses running around the pens, chickens and rabbits to feed and the smell of hay, which so reminded me of my grandmother's farm in New Brunswick. There were tractor races back then too, would love to see that come back, but I guess demolition derbies are today's option.

I will never forget that weekend and I proudly brought that blue ribbon home and my family put the painting and the ribbon in the livingroom where it stayed for many years.

I have been back to the Massey Fair many times over the last 50 plus years and have won many ribbons, but that first one is the most precious. Mrs. Armstrong is long gone now, but her legacy lives on with sharing her talents with kids like me.

That's what the Massey Fair is all about ... traditions that are shared from one generation to the next... and the next.

The exhibits are still there, the midway, the roosters, cows and the smell of hay. So, if your little one has a drawing or talent to share, enter it and build those memories of a blue ribbon. All entries have to be brought in by Thursday evening to allow for judging on Friday, and the opening of the fair; and kick start the memories!!

Splash Pad Idea For Espanola Goes To Community

Espanola Council did not give its immediate approval to the building of a new splash pad in Espanola, but believe the idea has merit.

Local resident Melanie Blais appeared before council Tuesday, August 13th to present a detailed report about the project, which she says can be totally funded by the community through fundraising.

Resident Melanie Blais says she hopes to build a splash pad around 2,700 square feet at a cost of \$220,000 and the ideal location would be at the Espanola Regional Recreation Complex. She told council it would need little maintenance and the fundraising would be done by volunteers for financial and in kind donations, as well as grants. She says it would also be accessible to special needs and be eco-friendly.

Council thanked her for the presentation and recommended the report be brought to Community Services and the Committee Recreation for further research.

Immunizations A Priority For School

Parents are required to make sure their children's immunizations are up to date and Public Health Sudbury & Districts is providing online registration.

Nurse Karyl McGibbon, says the province has introduced Immunization Connect Ontario, a new secure online system for submitting information to health units.

She stresses all children attending school or licensed daycares must have their immunization up to date in time for the new school vear.

Letters are sent to parents or students when records are incomplete.

The health unit requires that students be vaccinated to continue to attend school and for parents to send the agency their updated vaccine information, so it can update the Ministry of Health records on each child.

Immunization Connect Ontario is simple to access.

"It is a great alternative to paper records," adds McGibbon. "Parents and students can view their own immunization record online and can report any new vaccinations students received to this online site found at phsd.ca/ reportvaccines.

"It's like vellow the immunization card, only better. However, vaccination records can also be printed if a paper copy is required."

Immunization Connect Ontario can be accessed at phsd.ca. The student's Ontario Health Card number is required. Children 16 years of age and older can access and report vaccinations themselves.

The addition of a bit of maple syrup adds a nice subtle sweetness. My daughter made it for dinner at her house last week and everyone thought it was delicious. The following recipe is a guideline; you will see I added a couple variations. Feel free to make it your own by adding or omitting ingredients to your liking. It's a great salad to make using garden fresh onions, cucumbers and tomatoes. She used marinated mozzarella balls instead of cheddar cheese which was a nice touch. Pasta Salad with Balsamic Vinaigrette • 1 lb Tricolor Pasta • 1/2 Cucumber, chopped small ■ • 1/2 Red Bell Pepper, diced • 1/2 cup diced Red Onion or Green Onions • 2/3 cup diced Tomatoes or Cherry Tomatoes halved • 1/2 cup Black Olives or Kalamata Olives

- 8 oz Cheddar Cheese cubed or Marinated Mozzarella Balls
 - 1/8- 1/4 cup of chopped fresh Basil

- ¹/₄ cup Balsamic Vinegar
- ¹/₂ cup Olive Oil
- 2 tbsp of Maple Syrup (add more or less to your taste)
- 1/8 tsp Garlic Powder
- Sprinkle of Onion Powder
- Salt and pepper to taste

Boil pasta until al dente, drain and allow to cool. Combine all ingredients for dressing and whisk until well blended. In a large bowl combine all salad ingredients, add dressing and toss to coat evenly.
