Ambulance Tires Almost Flattened Following **Drop-Offs (Only Kidding)**





Deal Between RDSB and Support Staff Reached

The union representing its approved by the board of cleaners, custodians and trades employees have reached a tentative agreement at the local level with the Rainbow District School Board.

Board Chair, Doreen Dewar, says once the deal has been ratified by members of the Canadian Union of Public Employees Local 895 and trustees, details will released.

She adds the new deal, if approved, will be retroactive from September 1st, 2019 to August 31, 2022.

The contract affects workers Espanola, Massey, Manitoulin Island and Sudbury.



PHSD Calling For Comprehensive **Tobacco And E-Cigarette Strategy**

The Board of Health for Public Health Sudbury & Districts is calling on the provincial government to adopt an expertcomprehensive informed tobacco and e-cigarette strategy to address flavoured e-juice, online sales to minors, treatment programs for youth cessation, and public education. Board Chair, René Lapierre, says the organization supports Ontario government's decision to ban the promotion of vapour products in corner stores and gas stations.

He adds that it is seen as an important first step in reducing exposure and accessibility to vapour products, but more needs to be done.

He says the message is clear— If you don't smoke, don't vape. Medical Officer of Health and CEO Dr. Penny Sutcliffe says a provincial strategy is needed that firmly addresses vaping and tobacco use as issues that go hand-in-hand.

She adds many e-cigarette users have never smoked tobacco, they are not using the product to quit smoking and they are putting their health at risk.

The rapid proliferation of e-cigarette use is fuelling mass recruitment of new consumers to an established industry, which profits from nicotine addiction. Many e-cigarette users are unaware of the potential harms of regular or occasional use, and there is evidence that e-cigarette use increases youth uptake of tobacco.

Nicotine is a powerfully addictive chemical, and its use is not without risks. The evidence of e-cigarettes' effectiveness quitting smoking pales comparison with proven methods of cessation that can be used in combination, like nicotine replacement therapy, medication, and counselling. Ouick facts:

23% of Canadian youth (15-19) and 29% of young adults (20-24) reported having tried an e-cigarette (2017). In 2018, the youth number increased by 74%. There is no reason to expect a different trend for

Forty-four Ontarians die every day of tobacco-related causes or 16 000 deaths every year.

Nearly one in five Ontarians smoke. There are 1.8 million daily smokers in Ontario, and over 1 million Ontarians try to quit each year. Quitting is a long frustrating journey with many false starts.

Tobacco costs Ontario nearly \$7 billion annually (\$2.7 billion direct health care, \$4.2 billion indirect costs).

The message is clear—If you don't smoke, don't vape. If you do smoke, consider quitting with the help of proven methods (nicotine replacement therapy, medication, one-onone support, etc.). If all else fails, and with medical advice, people who are struggling to quit could carefully consider trying e-cigarettes: they may be safer than cigarettes, which kill half of all their long-term users. And finally, if you do vape, don't also smoke.

S. Geiger Public School



Recipe

These cookies are soft and nearly cake-like and the dough is dependable and nice to work with. The secret is a little bit



of sour cream mixed into the dough. It doesn't affect the flavour but ensures that the cookies stay fluffy and soft as they bake. You can omit the nutmeg, but adding it adds a subtle hint of holiday spice around this time of year. I made these yesterday and wanted to make them even spicier for our spice loving family, so I found and made a spiced buttercream recipe to decorate them with. It's amazing and would also be delicious on pumpkin desserts. I only made half of the frosting recipe and it was the perfect amount for the cookie recipe.

Sour Cream Cut Out Cookies


- 3 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 cup butter, softened
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup sour cream
- 2 eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 teaspoon baking powder.
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg (optional)

Preheat oven to 375°F use a non-stick baking sheet or line a baking sheet with parchment paper. Set aside. In a large bowl, beat butter and sugar together with an electric mixer until well combined. Mix in eggs and vanilla until thoroughly incorporated. In a separate bowl, whisk together flour, baking powder, baking soda, salt and nutmeg (if using). Add dry ingredients to the sugar/butter mixture, alternating with the sour cream, mixing well after each addition. Flatten dough into a disc, cover with plastic wrap and chill for about one hour. You can skip this step if needed, but it makes the cookies fluffier. Roll dough out on a lightly floured surface and cut into desired shapes (1/4 to ½ inch thick). Place onto prepared baking sheets and cook until lightly golden, 7- 10 minutes. Let cookies cool on wire rack and decorate with favourite frosting.

Spiced Buttercream Frosting

- 1 ½ cups of butter, room temperature
- 5 cups powdered sugar
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- 1 tsp nutmeg

In a mixing bowl beat the softened butter using an electric mixer for 1-2 minutes. Add in the powdered sugar (2 cups at a time) and the cinnamon and nutmeg, by hand or on low. Continue to beat in the sugar until the frosting is smooth and tastes good to you. Use on cupcakes, cake or cookies! Makes enough frosting for 24 cupcakes or a 9x13" cake.

As a vegetarian for over 3 years, I can confidently say that this recipe has my stamp of approval.

Meatless Shepherd's Pie

Ingredients FILLING

- 1 medium onion (diced)
- 2 cloves garlic (minced)
- 1 1/2 cups uncooked brown or green lentils (rinsed and drained)
- 4 cups vegetable stock
- 2 tsp fresh thyme (or sub 1 tsp dried thyme per 2 tsp fresh)
- 1 10-ounce bag frozen mixed veggies: peas, carrots, green beans, and corn

MASHED POTATOES

- 3 pounds yukon gold potatoes, partially peeled (thoroughly washed)
- 3-4 Tbsp butter
- Salt and pepper (to taste)

Instructions

- 1. Slice large potatoes in half, place in a large pot and fill with water. Bring to a low boil, then generously salt, cover and cook for 20-30 minutes or until they slide off a knife very easily.
- 2. Once cooked, drain then transfer to a mixing bowl. Mash until smooth. Add desired amount of butter and season with salt and pepper to taste. Loosely cover and set aside.
- 3. While potatoes are cooking, preheat oven to 425 degrees F (218
 C) and lightly grease a 2-quart baking dish.
- 4. In a large saucepan over medium heat, sauté onions and garlic in 1 Tbsp olive oil until lightly browned and caramelized about 5 minutes.
- 5. Add a pinch each salt and pepper. Then add lentils, stock, and thyme and stir. Bring to a low boil. Then reduce heat to simmer. Continue cooking until lentils are tender (35-40 minutes).
- 6. In the last 10 minutes of cooking, add the frozen veggies, stir, and cover to meld the fla-vours together.
- 7. OPTIONAL: To thicken the mixture, add 2-3 Tbsp mashed potatoes and stir. Alternative-ly, scoop out 1/2 of the mixture and whisk in 2 Tbsp cornstarch or arrowroot powder and whisk. Return to the pan and whisk to thicken.
- 8. Taste and adjust seasonings as needed. Then transfer to your prepared oven-safe baking dish and carefully top with mashed potatoes. Smooth down with a spoon or fork and sea-son with another crack of pepper and a little sea salt.
- 9. Place on a baking sheet to catch overflow and bake for 10-15 minutes or until the mashers are lightly browned on top.
- 10. Let cool briefly before serving. The longer it sits, the more it will thicken. Let cool com-pletely before covering, and then store in the fridge for up to a few days. Reheats well in the microwave.
