By Rosalind Russell - A well-known musician and education assistant from the Massey area needs a liver transplant. According to Leslie Knibbs, his wife, Elizabeth (Beth) Cassidy, has a rare liver condition called Wilson's disease where the body cannot assimilate copper properly and eventually it collects in various organs causing organ failure. Knibbs says in Beth's case, they were able to keep it in check for the last 25 years, but on December 22nd, her liver failed. She is now on medication and waiting

She is now on medication and waiting a partial or full transplant, if a match is found.

The cost of the medications, over \$1,500

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Public Beware Of Frauds And Scams

(OPP) would like to remind the public that there are many schemes being used to defraud the public and businesses.

In recent months there have been several ransomware (hack/ virus) attacks on businesses and municipal government offices within Ontario. The purpose of this alert is to inform Ontario Municipalities of this recent trend, providing background details and information on handling ransomware incidents.

WHAT IS A RANSOMWARE ATTACK?

A ransomware attack occurs when a cybercriminal infects a victim's computer systems with malware that encrypts the data on those systems making them inaccessible and unusable without a decryption key. The cybercriminals will then demand some sort of ransom (usually in Bitcoin) in exchange for the decryption key. There are many types of ransomware that are distributed in various ways. The most common methods of infection begin with a phishing email or direct hacking of a vulnerable computer system.

WHO IS BEING TARGETED? Everyone is a target, but individuals tend to be targeted by mass-market ransomware campaigns, while businesses and government offices tend to be the victims of more targeted attacks. Recently in Ontario, there has been a number of attacks on businesses and municipal government offices.

WHO SHOULD I CONTACT ASSISTANCE AND WHAT INFORMATION IS REQUIRED?

- Information provided to your local police service can then be provided to the O.P.P. Cybercrime Investigations Team to assist in identifying the particular family and versions of ransomware impacting Ontario.
- A screenshot/photograph of the ransomware demand

- The Ontario Provincial Police A screenshot/photograph of the encrypted files including full file name and extension
 - · Any contact email address provided by the attackers
 - Any bitcoin wallet addresses provided by the attackers

WHAT SHOULD BEDONE TO PREVENT A RANSOMWARE ATTACK?

IT technicians of private and public entities should constantly assess and invest in the security of their computer systems. An integral part of prevention is to ensure proper offline backups of computer system data, strong password policies, and cyber security education and awareness for their employees.

DOES THE OPP SUPPORT PAYING THE RANSOM?

Individuals or businesses that receive a security or financial threat must determine themselves whether a ransom should be paid. The OPP does not support paying ransomware attackers, as it only encourages further criminal activity, and there is no guarantee payment will restore encrypted data. That being said, companies and individual victims should address threats based upon the nature and severity of the threat and only after carefully considering the best interests of the individual company's employees. stakeholders and shareholders. Regardless of the decision made by the municipality. business, or individual, the OPP strongly encourages reporting ransomware incidents to your local police service.

Drivers Give Police Poor Excuses For Passing Stopped School Buses

Drivers give police poor excuses for passing stopped school buses

Pierre Ranger, the chair of the Let's Remember Adam billboard campaign, people who are caught passing a stopped school bus with its stop arm extended and lights flashing, give the police a wide range of excuses.

Ranger is the older brother of Adam Ranger, the five-yearold Mattawa boy who was struck and killed February 11th, 2000 while getting off a school bus in front of his home. This is the 19th anniversary of the youngster's death.

Pierre Ranger says none of the reasons people give police make sense and there are two of them that stand out.

The first, he says, is people "literally feel they don't have time to stop".

Ranger says people figure if they wait for the school bus to let students on and off the bus, they're going to be late getting where they have to be.

He says another poor excuse is the driver claims he or she was distracted.

"They say they didn't even know the school bus was there," Ranger says.

"Well if you didn't notice the school bus was there, how are you going to see a small child crossing the road in front of the school bus?"

Ranger has been lobbying to have cameras installed on the stop arm of school buses which would photograph vehicles that pass the stopped bus.

He's also suggesting a change to the eight light system on Ontario school buses.

Currently school buses have four red lights on the front and four on the back which begin flashing when the bus is coming to a stop.

Ranger says other Canadian provinces have a slightly different version of the eight light system.

He says in other provinces the front of the vehicle is equipped with two amber lights and two red lights and the rear has the same setup.

"So when the amber lights start flashing it's a warning that the bus is about to stop and when the red lights come on, it means you have to stop," Ranger said. He says the lighting is similar to traffic lights which give approaching motorists advance notice that the light is about to go red

Recipe

Take a tough chuck roast, slow cook it on low for hours, and turn it into a tender roast with a creamy mushroom/onion gravy all in one pan. I made the slow



cooker version last week with awesome results. When I got home from work, I removed the beef from the slow cooker to be sliced, poured the mushroom/onion drippings into a pot on the stove, and quickly thickened it with flour and water to make gravy. It was delicious served over mashed potatoes.

Beef Roast in Creamy Mushroom Gravy

- 5 lb chuck roast
- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 1 package of white or cremini mushrooms
- 1 large yellow onion, chopped
- package dry onion soup mix
- 2 10.75 oz cans of cream of mushroom soup
- 1 1/4 cups water

Oven method:

Pre-heat vour oven to 400 °F. Heat a skillet or a Dutch oven over medium heat with olive oil it. Place the chuck roast in and brown on all sides in the hot oil. Keep the roast in the Dutch oven or put it in a lidded roaster. Place the mushrooms and onions around the chuck roast. Whisk together the onion and mushroom soups with the water until as smooth as possible (it will remain a bit chunky) Pour over the roast. Place the lid on top of the roaster/ Dutch oven and place it in the preheated oven. Cook for 20 minutes then turn down the oven to 325°F. Cook for another 4-5 hours until the roast pulls apart easily when touched with a fork. Remove and plate. Whisk together the mushrooms and onions and drippings to make a gravy. Serve over the beef.

Slow Cooker Instructions:

Heat a skillet over medium heat with the olive oil it. Place the chuck roast in and brown on all sides in the hot oil. Place into the slow cooker. Place the mushrooms and onion around the chuck roast. Whisk together the onion and mushroom soup with the water until as smooth as possible (It will remain a bit chunky) Pour over the roast and place the lid on the slow cooker. Cook for 8-10 hours on low until the roast pulls apart easily when touched with a fork. Remove and plate. Whisk together the mushrooms and onions and drippings to make a gravy. Serve over the beef.
