
By Rosalind Russell - Espanola Council unanimously voted to donate to the Espanola Public/AB Ellis School 100th anniversary celebrations.

Building Inspectors Council/Farmers – Building Permits

Municipal councils can review building permits and other fees which are written into law as bylaws, but that will take an amendment process to do so.

That didn't sit well with Sables-Spanish Rivers Township dairy farmer, John Mooney, who has been charged over \$11,000 for a building permit to expand his

Building inspectors, Dan Rivet and Mike Campbell, appeared before township council on Wednesday to explain the process to council and attending farmers.

They stress they do the work in assessing what building permits are needed, carry out the inspections and sign off on projects, but do not set the fees.

Mooney says he realizes he has to pay building permit fees, but wants to know why there is such a disparity between different municipalities, presenting a graph by the Ontario Federation of Agriculture.

Max Chapman Running For Green Party Of Canada In Algoma-Manitoulin-Kapuskasing

Chapman grew up on Manitoulin Island and is currently a student at Queen's University, seeking a Bachelor of Arts degree in political studies. Chapman has also worked for the YMCA of Northeastern Ontario's John Island Camp as a manager and wilderness guide.

Chapman says he is running for the Greens because they are constant with their commitment to phasing out fossil fuels and moving Canada into renewables. They are also the only party who

show a willingness to work together on the big issues facing Canadians, instead of getting bogged down by rhetoric and partisanship. When you have reports from the UN saying we have

20 years to make a change before we can't stop the worst effects of climate change, the time for half-measures is over. Chapman is looking forward to hearing from people across Algoma-Manitoulin-Kapuskasing in the months leading up to the October election on issues that are important to them. He can

Recipe

In my opinion, celery is an underrated vegetable, yet one of the most used in my house. I put it in almost everything I cook from spaghetti sauce to soups. I



have a soft spot for it; when I was a kid my Grandma always had a heaping plate of cleaned celery sticks put out before family meals. I think of being at her house, every time I get a whiff of its distinctive smell. One of my favourite snacks is celery stuffed with Cheese Whiz or peanut butter, so when I came across this recipe, I thought what a great idea for an appetizer! If you don't feel like cooking bacon and want to keep it simple, there are bags of precooked bacon in the stores. You can use the recipe as a general guideline and switch it up to suit your taste. I think fresh dill and chopped olives would also be tasty.

Stuffed Celery Stalks

- · 4 5 stalks celery washed and dried
- 18 oz cream cheese softened
- 1/4 cup bacon chopped
- 1/2 cup cheddar cheese grated
- 1 tablespoon fresh parsley chopped
- 1 tablespoon fresh chives chopped
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon fresh cracked pepper
- 3 dashes hot sauce



Cut celery stalks in half and set aside. Using a food processor or hand held mixer, whip the cream cheese until smooth. Add in bacon, cheese, parsley, chives, salt, pepper and hot sauce. Pulse or blend until all ingredients are combined. Using a small spoon, fill the celery "boat" with cream cheese mixture. Sprinkle with additional chives and bacon if desired. Serve immediately!
