Winter Banner **Contest Voting Continues**






By Rosalind Russell - If you have not voted in the Espanola Winter Banner Contest, there is still an opportunity to do so.

NOTICE OF THE PASSING OF ZONING BYLAW

(Planning Act-Section 34)

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers passed the following Bylaws on the 22nd day of May, 2019.

PURPOSE AND EFFECT:

Bylaw 2019-21 - The purpose of the zoning amendment is to allow for a reduced frontage on a public road in the Rural Zone. The effect is to allow the minimum frontage on the public road to be no less than 13 meters. The property is described as Hallam Township, Parcel 490, Parcel 726, Part of Lot 8, Concession 6; Parcel 938, Lot 8, Concession 5. This application is subject to a consent application under the Planning Act.

Bylaw 2019-22 – The purpose of the zoning amendment is to allow for a reduced side yard setback in the Residential Zone. The effect is to allow for construction with a reduced exterior side yard setback. The property is described as Salter Township, Section 28, Parcel 28-1 & 29-1, Plan D261, Units 28 & 29. This application is not subject of any other application under the Planning Act.

APPEAL - The last date for filing a notice of appeal of the by-law is **June 24, 2019.** Any such appeal must be filed with the clerk of the municipality and must set out the reasons for the appeal and must be accompanied by the fee required by the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal. Only individuals, corporations and public bodies may appeal a by-law to the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal. A notice of appeal may not be filed by an unincorporated association or group. However, a notice of appeal may be filed in the name of an individual who is a member of the association or the group on its behalf. No person or public body shall be added as a party to the hearing of the appeal unless, before the by-law was passed, the person of public body made oral submissions at a public meeting or written submissions to the Council of the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers or, in the opinion of the Tribunal, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.

These bylaws are available for inspection in the municipal office during regular office hours.

SWIMMING POOLS - MASSEY

In 2016 Council amended the user fee bylaw to include a water usage fee for swimming pools, for properties in Massey serviced by the municipal water system. There is an annual fee of \$100.00 for properties with swimming pools, regardless of its size. If your property has been identified as having a swimming pool you will see an additional charge on the July – Sept. water bill. The total amount is due by September 30th.

Please note that all swimming pools which are at least 50cm (19.6 feet) in depth must be totally enclosed by a fence having a minimum height of 1.5m (5 feet) with a self-locking gate.

More Remains Found In Nelson Lake Road Area

More remains have been found following an extensive search in the Nelson Lake Road area. Sudbury Greater Police communications co-ordinator Kaitlyn Dunn says a human skull was found on the weekend leading extensive grid ground search by police and North Shore Search and Rescue over the last two days.

Dr. Scott Fairgrieve from the Centre of Forensic Science was also on the scene yesterday where a human skull was located on Saturday May

Dunn says the search yielded

additional human bones. which have been turned over to the Coroner's Office and the centre to carry out additional tests to determine the identity of the individual and the cause of death.

They will determine, as best they can, gender and possible age of the individual.

According to the Greater Sudbury Police, there are 11 people who have gone missing from the Sudbury area between 1974 and 2015 including former Espanola resident, Meaghan Pilon, who was last seen on September 12th, 2015.

OPP Police Briefs

(ESPANOLA, ON) - On May 13, 2019 at approximately 7:00 a.m., members from the Manitoulin Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) responded to a complaint of a stolen truck from a business in Espanola, Ontario.

The investigation revealed that the truck was stolen the previous evening May 12, 2019. The stolen truck was later recovered stuck in mud off Panache Lake Road, Sudbury District, Ontario.

As a result of the investigation, a 17-year-old youth from Espanola, Ontario has been charged with;

- Break, Enter a Place with Intent to Commit Indictable Offence, contrary to section 348(1)(a) of the Criminal Code (CC); and
- Theft of a Motor Vehicle, contrary to section 333.1 of the CC.
- A 15-year-old youth from Espanola, Ontario has been charged with:
- Break, Enter a Place with Intent to Commit Indictable Offence, contrary to section 348(1)(a) of the CC;
- Theft of Motor Vehicle, contrary to section 333.1 of the CC; and
- Fail to Comply with Sentence two counts, contrary to section 137 of the Youth Criminal Justice Act.

Both youths are scheduled to appear before the Ontario Court of Justice in Espanola on June 17, 2019.

The youth cannot be identified under provisions of the Youth Criminal Justice Act (YCJA).

(ESPANOLA, ON) - On May 26, 2019, an officer from the Manitoulin detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) was conducting a traffic stop with his emergency lights activated, when another vehicle failed to move over for the police vehicle. The officer located that

vehicle and conducted a stop. While speaking with the driver, the officer detected a strong odour of cannabis within the vehicle. A quantity of cannabis resin and cash was seized. The estimated street value of the seized items is over \$10,000. As a result of the investigation, 50-year-old John GAUDET of Miscouche, Prince Edward Island, has been charged with the following:

- Fail to Move into Another Lane for Emergency Vehicle or Tow Truck - If Safe to do, contrary to section 159(3) of the Highway Traffic Act;
- Possession of a Schedule II substance for the Purpose of Trafficking, contrary to section 5(2) of the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act; and
- Possession of Proceeds of Property Obtained by Crime Over \$5000, contrary to section 354(1)(a) of the Criminal Code.

The accused is scheduled to appear before the Ontario Court of Justice in Sudbury for a bail hearing on May 28, 2019.

The Ontario Move Over Law requires drivers to slow down when approaching an emergency vehicle or a tow truck on the roadside with its amber lights flashing and, on roads with two or more lanes, move over and leave a lane of space between you and the emergency vehicle if it is safe to do so.

Espanola Council Approves Site Plan For **New Business**

Another new business is opening in Espanola and it was welcome news to Espanola council.

Espanola Deputy Mayor Bill Foster says the site plan for a new car wash being built by Ryan Bulloch was presented May 28th, and that is all ready to go, but he did not agree with a part of the motion that asked for the security deposit be waived. Foster says he worries it would set a precedent for other developments and sometimes projects fall through.

He explained the security deposit helps the town recover any possible costs if such a scenario occurs.

Fellow councillors agreed with him and moved that the motion be amended to approve the site plan and it is to include a letter of security for \$25,000.

Construction is already underway and is expected to be completed by early summer.

No Live-Streaming In Sables-Spanish Rivers

There will be no live-streaming or videotaping in Sables-Spanish Rivers Township for the time being.

Councillor Glenda Massicotte says council decided that with the Internet at the municipal office not meeting the requirements to live stream, council decided they would not install it for now.

She adds there was also

Espanola that would be available for trial, but it had many glitches. She adds there was no motion, just an informal discussion, but council is continuing to look into different equipment and funding options to eventually, get the service in place.

A petition signed by over 130 residents was presented to council earlier this Spring asking equipment from the Town of for the service to be implemented.

of Excellence - Instructional Design category for submission, Simulated Home Visits. Leading that project was Nursing professor Laura Killam, Sarah Wendorf, an Instructional Designer in Cambrian's Hub, and Jeff Tranchemontagne.

This week's tip: Wash and rinse your recycling! Did you know that not cleaning your

recyclables before sending them to the curb can be equivalent to not recycling them at ALL? In fact, it can even prevent your neighbours' waste from being recycled too!

■ But why?

In a recycling facility, food residue is considered a form of contamination because it can prevent materials from being broken down and processed properly. If contamination levels are too high, materials may have to be rejected from the recycling process and sent to the landfill.

Here are a few tips for washing your recycling:

- > Wash dirty recyclables as soon as they're empty! The removal of fresh food residue is much easier than when it has dried.
- > Gather all your dirty recyclables. When you're finished washing dishes in the sink, use the leftover soapy water for your containers and cans!
- > Low on time? Save up your dirty recyclables until you have enough to run one full dishwasher load of them!

Inter-Library Loans Will Resume In Northern Ontario Starting In June

The Ontario government is reversing one of its budgetary decisions when it comes to a specific service offered by libraries.

The government has indicated it will resume interlibrary loan services in Northern Ontario by June 1st, but not immediately in the south.

The reversal came as a result of the outcry by library users and staffers, but with the future of such loans in the southern

part of the province still in limbo, it remains unclear how much of the popular service will return.

The Ford government cut library funding by 50 percent across the board as part of its 2019 budget and that could still mean the loss of library staff across the province.

Northern Ontario library services are overseen by Ontario Library Service-North.

Recipe

This cheesy version of spinach dip is a favourite. It takes just minutes to put together and will be the first thing eaten at your next gathering. The most



important part of making this recipe is to be sure all of the water is removed from your spinach. You can squeeze the spinach between your fingers to remove the liquid, press it in a potato ricer, or wrap the spinach in a few layers of paper towels to wring out all the liquid. You can use frozen spinach in a pinch, but it has a stringier texture.

Hot Spinach Dip

- 8 ounces cream cheese softened
- 1 cup sour cream
- 10 ounces fresh spinach leaves
- 1 teaspoon minced garlic
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1/2 cup grated parmesan cheese
- 1 1/2 cups shredded mozzarella cheese divided use
- 1 tablespoon chopped parsley
- bread, crackers and vegetables for serving
- cooking spray

Steam or sauté the spinach until wilted. Let cool, and then wring out all the excess water. Coarsely chop the spinach. Preheat the oven to 375 degrees F. Coat a small baking dish or skillet with cooking spray. Place the cream cheese, sour cream, cooked spinach, garlic, salt, pepper, parmesan cheese and 3/4 cup of the mozzarella cheese in a bowl. Stir until well combined. Spread the spinach mixture into the prepared dish. Top with remaining mozzarella cheese. Bake for 20 minutes or until dip is bubbly and cheese is melted. Turn the oven to broil and cook for 2-3 more minutes or until cheese starts to brown. Sprinkle with chopped parsley then serve with bread, crackers and vegetables.
