### New Signage Posted By Victim Services -Buying Sex Is A Crime



By Rosalind Russell - A new billboard sign between McKerrow and Espanola is pretty hard to miss, especially since its message hits hard: buying sex is a crime.

The sign is a joint project between Manitoulin Northshore Victims Services and the Manitoulin and Area Coalition against Human Trafficking.

Natasha Falle, Anti-Human Trafficking Project Co-ordinator, says there are very vulnerable people in the communities on Manitoulin Island and the North Shore. She adds that the highway signage is deliberately located on Highway 17 because it is part of what she calls the circuit in prostitution, especially being so close to Sudbury.

Falle adds women make up the bulk of the victims and collectively, people of all genders younger than 25 years old make up 72 percent of victims.

And of that, 70 percent are women.

## Espanola Regional Hospital Foundation Take On Major Campaign

The equipment in the x-ray department at the Espanola Regional Hospital is near the end of its service life and the hospital foundation is taking on a major campaign to raise funds for its replacement.

Foundation spokesperson, Terri Noble, says the equipment needs to be upgraded to continue providing stateof-the-art medical care for treating patients.

She says the retrofit will cost just over half-a-million-dollars and the fundraising is off to a great start with the hospital auxiliary donating \$30,000 to the project last Thursday.

Noble says the fundraiser will be part of The Moose Annual Charity Radiothon on CJJM on December 13th.



## Report States Hundreds Of Teachers To Be **Lost Due To Larger Class Sizes**

School boards across the Manitoulin Algoma, and Sudbury Districts will be losing teachers as part of the change to larger class sizes.

The Rainbow District School Board will lose 65 teachers over the next four years as a result of larger class sizes, according to a report by the Canadian Centre for Policy Alternatives.

The Catholic boards across the North will lose up to 66.

According to the Ontario Secondary School Teacher's Federation, the Behind the


Numbers Report not only allows users to view the loss of teachers predicted for individual school boards, viewers can also see some Ontario school boards will lose hundreds.


Bedard was selected for his award due to his outstanding athletic abilities in both summer and winter events, as well as being a role model for his fellow athletes.

## Recipe

This soup is hearty and delicious and a perfect comfort meal as the weather turns colder. I made it the other day for supper; preparing it in the morning



before I went to work. A quick mash of the potatoes when you get home, add the last three ingredients and within 20 minutes, you have a tasty, filling meal. It's a thick soup. I added a bit more milk to thin it to the consistency I like. I served it with toasted buns.

#### **Slow Cooker Potato and Ham Soup**

- 8 cups russet potatoes, diced
- 1 yellow onion, diced
- 2 large carrots, peeled and chopped
- 1/2 cup chopped celery
- 16 ounces cubed ham (I used a ham steak)
- 1 teaspoon Kosher salt
- 1/4 teaspoon fresh cracked black pepper
- 4 cups chicken broth (1 box of chicken broth)
- 1/4 cup flour
- 1 1/2 cups of cream (you can also use milk, or I used a combination)
- ½ cup sour cream

Add the potatoes, onion, carrot, celery, ham, Kosher salt, pepper and chicken broth to your slow cooker and cook on low 7-8 hrs or high 4-5 hrs. Using a potato masher, mash about 1/3 of the potatoes. (Don't worry, the ham won't really mash that much). Mix the flour, cream/milk and sour cream in a bowl, and then add to the soup. Cover and cook on high for an additional 15



minutes. If you find it too thick, add additional milk until it's the desirable consistency. Taste and season.


