With the reopening of the Espanola Regional Recreation Complex also comes COVID-19 protocols to ensure public safety.

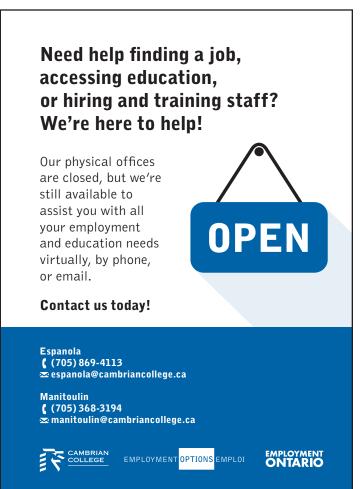
Joel Yusko, the manager of leisure services says the pool and fitness centre has been reopened but is using a phasedin approach following the provinces Stage 3 Opening Plans.

How Hot Was July? We Lost The Weather Channel To A Wildfire!

According to Environment Canada, July was the melting and flooding at such a high rate, hottest month in Ontario since they began keeping records 84 years ago. 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Wild Tea

Did you know that a number of common plants can be brewed into tasty teas with medicinal properties?! It's true! This is something I've been playing around with not only using plants from my garden, but also from



the forest around my house. The instructions are simple, combine a handful of washed, fresh herb/plant with 1-4 cups of boiling water, let that steep, and enjoy! Here's a look at are a few different plants I've been experimenting with:

Wild Strawberries/Blueberries/Raspberries: Beginning with something a little obvious - any of these berries AND their leaves can be used to brew a tea with an herbal berry flavour.

Birch: Young birch twigs and leaves can be used to make a winter-green tasting tea that is thought to be helpful in treating inflammatory conditions like arthritis.

Bee Balm: This one you might find in your flower garden but it can make a delicious earl-grey tasting tea. Bee balm's believed benefits are relaxation, pain relief, and digestive support.

Red Clover: This one's not just for the bees! Clover adds a nice sweetness to teas and is believed to treat hormonal issues, especially symptoms of menopause and PMS.

Remember, never ingest a plant you are not 100% sure of. If needed, ask for help when identifying your plants. Have fun!

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Recipe

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It doesn't get much simpler than the following recipe, but sometimes even the simplest of recipes are the tastiest. If you grow yellow beans in your garden like I



do, then you know as much as you love them, there's always an ample supply of them. I boil them, steam them, add them to soup and stews, pickle them and share them with friends. The other night after picking some from the garden, I quickly looked for a different way to serve them and found the following recipe. It's very basic, but the buttered, toasted crumbs added a nice nutty, crunch to them. We enjoyed them and I hope you do too.

Wax Beans With Buttered Bread Crumbs

- 4 Cups of whole fresh wax (yellow) beans
- 1/4 cup of butter
- 1/2 cup of white bread crumbs (I used Panko Bread Crumbs)
- Salt, to taste

Wash and trim beans into thirds (or one-inch pieces). Steam the beans for 15 to 18 minutes using an electric steamer or double boiler. Melt 1/4 cup of butter in a frying pan over medium heat. Add beans and toss to coat in butter. Add 1/2 cup of white bread crumbs and continue to cook until bread crumbs are toasted (about another 5 to 10 minutes). Salt to taste.
