# Espanola Little Theatre's Grand Dame Is 90 Years Young



By Rosalind Russell - Sharon Sproule turned 90 last Friday, July 10. She was born and raised in Delhi, Ontario, a small tobacco town not far from Simcoe and Tillsonburg.

Sharon showed a talent for dance and performance very early in life. She and her high school best friend Faye often challenged the principal to explain why they couldn't do things that the boys could do. And that's how Sharon wound up leading the high school band as the drum major.

Sharon met Bob Sproule when they were training as teachers in London, Ontario. They married, moved to Nairn Centre in 1952, and fell in love with the area and Northern Ontario. Bob was hired the following year by Andy Ellis, the principal of what was then called Espanola Public School, later re-named AB Ellis Public School. Sharon, Red McCarthy, and Margaret Best founded The Espanola Little Theatre not long afterwards in 1958.

Having played a wide variety of characters over the years, Sharon says her favourite

> Running very unsuccessfully against Jimmy Carter for the 1976 Domocratic presidential nomination, Udall bombed in the very first primary in New England. After which he said: "You can go home again. In fact, the people of New Hampshire insisted on it." Later in the campaign and doing no better,

Udall was asked by a reporter: "What separates you from Jimmy Carter?" "About 700 delegates," he replied. Asked if he would accept the second spot Udall said: "I'm against all vice-including the vice presidency." Having fun with Carter after the president's infamous Playboy interview Udall quipped: "You think Plains, Georgia is small, my hometown of St. Johns, Arizona was so small you couldn't even lust in your heart."

Udall who had a glass eye, liked a drink or two and referred to himself as a "one-eyed Jack Mormon." While enlisting in the US Navy in 1942 it came time to read the eye chart. Udall put his left hand over his bad eye and rhymed off the letters. Then he put his right hand over his bad eye and again, rhymed off the letters. He passed.

After his dismal defeat in 1976 some party liberals urged him to take another shot at the Deomcratic nomination. Declining gracefully, Udall declared: "If nominated, I will run-for the Mexican border. If elected, I will fight extradition." Rare is the man who can rise above abject bitterness and forsake revenge for a very funny proverb. After losing a majority leadership battle despite

being assured of the support of members of the Democratic caucus, Udall waxed both profound and profane. "I have learned the difference between a cactus and a caucus," he said. "On a cactus, the pricks are on the outside."

Witty, self-deprecating and endlessly funny--Udall himself was no joke. Few elected representatives in the history of the United States could match his record legislative achievements and he was always described as "decent and graceful," even by his opponents.

Ravaged by Parkinson's disease and having lived almost his entire life in the two cities--St Johns, Arizona and Washington, D.C.--Udall was asked by family in which town he wished to be buried. Wry til you die, Mo Udall replied: "Surprise me."

Humour, modesty and classall words President Donald Trump would have to look up in a dictionary thereby making it only the second book he has ever picked up besides that Bible he held in a recent Washington photo op...upside down.

# New Manitoulin OPP Detachment Nearing Completion

The new Manitoulin OPP detachment, which will serve the Manitoulin Island and the Espanola area, is nearing completion.

Lauren Wiseman of Bird Construction says the 1,700 square metre facility will feature offices, evidence storage vaults, secure functions areas including holding cells and interview rooms, as well as a public admittance area. Located on Boosneck Road in Little Current, it will be state-of-the-art and is one of nine new detachments being constructed as part of the OPP Modernization Phase 11.

The COVID-19 pandemic caused slight delays, but completion is expected by the end of the year.

# Half Of Espanola Habitat For Humanity Duplex Sold

Espanola has lost half of its affordable Habitat for Humanity the COVID-19 pandemic hit, property to the open market. However, Woodcock says when the COVID-19 pandemic hit, the organization was not able

CEO of Habitat for Humanity Ontario Gateway North Kimberley Woodcock says when the Espanola duplex was completed three years ago they were sold to Habitat homeowners at an affordable price and supported by a Habitat mortgage featuring zero down payment, zero interest and geared-to-income monthly payments.

She says the homeowner of 365 Adelaide Street decided last year to sell her home and Woodcock explained Habitat exercised its first right of refusal and purchased the property in late 2019 with the intent of placing another homeowner from Espanola into the home, which has been vacant since then.

However, Woodcock says when the COVID-19 pandemic hit, the organization was not able to place another family and had to suspend all its operations on March 18th.

Woodcock explains to survive the financial crisis the organization is facing and to ultimately serve more families in the future, Habitat was forced to sell the home on the open market.

It was sold last month.

Woodcock recognizes that the build was supported by charity dollars, in-kind labour and material donations as a way of providing affordable housing in Espanola, but emphasizes they had no choice with no other funding coming in.

She adds this decision does not affect the neighbouring family who continues to reside in and enjoy their Habitat home.

# Six Teens Canoeing Across Ontario For Canadian Food Banks

Six Toronto teens who have some experience as camp counsellors are taking a canoe trip across Ontario to raise funds for food banks across Canada. The six left on June 26th from Wabakimi (WAB-BACK-IM-ME) Provincial Park near Thunder Bay and are making their way south-east to Ottawa.

With COVID-19 protocols allowing no open camps this summer, they decided to take the trip and set a goal of \$1,000 a day during their sixty-day excursion. They have already raised over \$46,000.

The six will be stopping in Espanola on August 4th and in North Bay on August 14th to pick up fresh supplies. The team is also receiving support from Tanner's YIG in Espanola.

They have an agreement with Food Banks Canada stipulating half of the funds raised must go to Indigenous communities across Canada.

# **Houseplant Tips & Tricks**

You may have noticed lately that houseplants are all the rage – and I'm here for it! My house is home to over 30 different leafy babies and I think it's a wonderful way to connect with nature inside our homes. Over the years, I've learned many tips and tricks to help my plants



thrive and this week I'm going to share a few with you:

- Clean your plants: Dust on the leaves of your plants can reduce their ability to photosynthesize (feed themselves). Clean them by placing them in your bathtub and showering them with lukewarm water OR gently wiping each leaf with a damp cloth |
- **Group them together:** Plants release water vapor through their leaves during the process of transpiration, so groups of plants can create a little pocket of humidity in a dry house.
- Fill a saucer with water: Another way to create humidity for your plants is to place your potted plant on top of or beside a saucer with water. As the water naturally evaporates, it will increase the humidity level around the plant. If you're placing your pot on top, be sure to put some pebbles in the saucer to still allow water to exit the drainage holes.
- *Use sheer curtains:* believe it or not, too much direct sun can I hurt your plants by drying them out and scorching their leaves. Try hanging sheer curtains on your windows to give them the right amount of filtered sunlight.

#### **Strawberry Butter Streusel Muffins**

- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup of sugar
- 2 tsps baking powder
- ½ tsp salt
- 1 cup milk
- 2 eggs
- ½ cup butter, melted
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1 cup fresh strawberries, diced

#### **For Streusel**

- 1/4 cup flour
- ½ cup sugar
- 2 tbsps butter, softened

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Make your streusel first. In a food processor, or with a pastry blender combine all ingredients until crumbly. Set aside. For the muffins, combine the flour, sugar, baking powder and salt in a large mixing bowl. In a medium bowl, beat eggs, then add milk and beat again. While beating, add butter and vanilla. Pour wet ingredients into your flour mixture and mix with a fork just until combined. Spoon a tablespoon of batter into paper lined muffin tin, add a few strawberry pieces then another tbsp of batter, being sure to only fill cups about 2/3 full. Top with 4-5 more strawberry pieces. Top with about 2 tsps of streusel mixture. Bake in oven for 25-30 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Let muffins rest for 10 minutes before removing to racks to cool completely.
