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Township Of Baldwin **Delivers Wellness Parcels** To Local Seniors





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As We Open Things Up, I Will Miss The Shutting Down

Eastwood, a still shot I recognized from the movie Gran Torino in which his character, the perpetually-pissed off Walt Kowalski is sitting on his porch, draining a six-pack of Pabst Blue Ribbon beer while scowling at the Asian gangbangers who have ruined his white Polish neighbourhood. Caption: "You never realize how anti-social you are until there's a pandemic and your life doesn't really change that much."

Move from Walt's front porch to my back deck, swap the Pabst for a Hopkins Tomb Stout, replace the scowl with a satisfied smile as I admire my newly constructed 'dresser drawer garden' and yeah, that photo pretty much captures my coronavirus quarantine right there.

Spending great gobs of time in solitude, preferring silence to socializing, throwing together a single salad for lunch while planning dinner for one, using a long walk as a midday break while listening to CBC-Radio--for writers and especially those who live alone, quarantining has always been the most productive way to work. It has never been some weird form of warfare against an unseen, evil enemy. The quiet to read and calmly think, the freedom to act without distraction-quarantine is the ideal atmosphere for a stay-at-home writer scripting and pitching three or four projects at once. You need to keep most of the real world out so the money keeps coming in.

I lost track of dates so it was either "Democratic Hoax Day" or "It'll All Be Over By Easter Day" when the coronavirus really grabbed Canada by the throat. This hideous invasion was not confirmed by our leaders but by a massive run on toilet paper, I did not panic. Nor did my town of Port Colborne where Frank

Confusion reigned in Ontario-marijuana shops closed but sex shops remained open, as shoe stores closed people were encouraged to walk more. Soon burglars were staying home and hairdressers were coming into your home late at night and demanding cash. Still I remained calm.

> It must have been 9:30am on "We Have It Totally Under Control Day" because I was half listening to CBC-Radio news at the bottom of the hour and I heard "LCBO." No. Can't be. Oh oh, panic time indeed.

> Who? Me? Horde? By 9:50 I was standing on the sidewalk beside the LCBO next to a guy wearing work boots and a lime green construction vest.

> "Do you think they'll close it down" I

"No, it doesn't open til ten."

"Yeah but they're closing everything else down."

"Why?"

"The virus."

"What virus?"

"Ah, why are you here? Now?"
"I'm here everyday at this time."

That's when I began to sweat, not at all liking my chances of surviving a world pandemic by depending on the conscientiousness of others

Daily, time passed slowly, weekly, it seemed to fly by like light. I didn't always respond immediately to inquiries from family and friends about my health or state of mind. So occasionally I'd send a 'one answer to all' like: "All good, thank you. Had a bit of a scare last night when I thought I was symptomatic so I did two Lysol shooters and slept with a UV light bulb in my rectum. Today I'm feeling fine. I'm walking kinda funny but I'm feeling pretty good." I think that was just before "Celebrate Hydroxychloroquine Day."

I was following way, way too much news. National newscasts highlighted the 'new normal' with stories of doom, gloom, death and destruction and I thought...actually that's a lot like the 'old world.' The only real difference was that

COVID-19 had managed to decimate the world economy faster than the Wall Street swindlers of 2008. When I found myself saying-- "Wow. Doug Ford really is human after all" and "Are Wolf Blitzer's eyes really that blue?"-- I unplugged both TVs. And having no use for it, I burned my 2020 planner.

Sadly, now that the economy and society are prematurely opening up, my doorbell will ring once more, the chatter of friends on my deck will drown out the song of the cardinal and all the benefits of self-isolation will become diluted by distraction. My lasting image of the world in self isolation will still be that photo of the little old lady smiling through her living room window in a small town in Pennsylvania holding a sign that read: "NEED MORE BEER." Espanola CAO Cynthia Townsend says council passed a motion on Tuesday to cancel the fireworks, and the August movie night.


They also decided not to host

- 3. Wash your dishes with biodegradable soap and scatter strained dishwater 200 ft away from lakes or streams.

Rainbow Schools Offer Many Opportunities To Earn New Credits This Summer

Rainbow Board will offer many opportunities for students to earn new credits towards their Ontario Secondary School Diploma this summer, including Summer School Co-op, e-Learning and the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Course (OSSLC).

Summer School Co-operative Education

Students can earn one or two new virtual co-op credits this summer by enrolling in the online Co-op course DCO3O. Face-to-face Co-op credits may be available based on Public Health guidelines. If you have an in-person Co-op placement arranged for the summer, please contact your school's guidance office to discuss requirements.

Students wishing to obtain one or two credits must register for the session from Thursday, July 2, 2020 to Friday, July 31, 2020.

To ensure the proper course codes are applied, all students registering for Summer Coop must include a credit counselling summary from their current school.

If face-to-face placements become an option, students are responsible for providing their own transportation to their placements.

School Summer e-Learning Program

Secondary students can obtain one new Grade 11 or 12 credit in English, math, geography, law, science, social science, Aboriginal or Canadian and World Studies through the Summer e-Learning Program. Grade 10 civics and careers courses are also available.

Courses will run from Thursday, July 2, 2020 to Friday, July 31, 2020. Students will require a reliable computer with Internet access to enrol in the Summer e-Learning Program.

Students must register no later than Friday, June 19, 2020 with a guidance counsellor using the Ministry of Education's Seat Reservation System.

Summer Literacy Course -**OSSLC**

The Ontario Secondary School Literacy Course (OSSLC) is being offered as a new credit course through e-Learning for students in Rainbow Schools. The OSSLC will run from Thursday, July 2, 2020 to Friday, July 31, 2020. Students will need reliable

computer Internet access to enrol in the OSSLC.



Recipe

I know what you're thinking, "everyone knows how to make macaroni salad." I've been making it for years and would just "wing it" when it came to the dressing.



Last week when I was making it to have with barbecued hamburgers, I decided to look up a recipe and see what kind of dressing recipe I could find. I found the following one and was impressed with it. It had great flavour and the salad stayed creamy while we enjoyed the leftovers all week. I didn't add the hard-boiled eggs, I would say it's optional. You can make this salad your own. I sometimes also add; radish, olives, chopped carrots, cheese cubes etc. This is the perfect summer side dish, it's better the next day so it can be made a day ahead and is easy to transport to potlucks.

Classic Macaroni Salad

- 1-pound (3 cups) elbow pasta or ditalini (small tubes)
- 1 red bell pepper chopped
- 2 ribs celery finely chopped
- 1/2 cup finely chopped red onion, green onions or chives
- 1/2 cup chopped sweet pickles
- 3 hard boiled eggs chopped

Dressing

- 1 cup mayonnaise (Not Miracle Whip)
- 2 tablespoons apple cider vinegar
- 1 tablespoon Dijon mustard
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper



Bring a large pot of salted water to a boil and cook pasta according to package directions for al dente. Transfer the pasta to a colander, rinse it with cold water and drain well. Set pasta aside to cool while you prepare the rest of the salad ingredients. Stir the pasta occasionally to prevent it from sticking together. In a large bowl, combine the red bell pepper, celery, onion, pickles and hard boiled eggs. To make the dressing, combine the mayonnaise, apple cider vinegar, Dijon, sugar, salt and pepper in a medium bowl. Whisk until well combined and smooth. When the pasta is completely cooled, add it to the bowl with the other pasta salad ingredients. Pour on the dressing and stir until everything is well combined. Cover and chill macaroni salad in the refrigerator
