Espanola High Curling Team Going To Provincial



Railroad Owner Delays Deadline For Ceasing Operation Of HCR

The Huron Central Railway between Sudbury and Sault Ste. Marie will continue to operate as long as the two upper levels of government continue to work towards a solution.

Genesee & Wyoming Canada commercial officer, Christian Richard, told Sault Ste. Marie City council the company will defer their March 31st deadline to cease operations as long as talks with the feds and the Ford government continue.

Richard says the company invests about 12 percent of

its revenues annually into maintaining the line, but adds it needs an investment of \$40-million dollars to maintain the short line.

He adds the line is owned by CP Rail but it doesn't contribute toward track maintenance, so the company has been responsible for upkeep since they were contracted to take over operations in 1997.

The 278 kilometres of track is a vital part of transporting goods for Domtar in Espanola, Algoma Steel in Sault Ste. Marie and EACOM in Nairn Centre.

Cambrian College Hosts High School Skilled **Trades Events**

She says the winners will compete at Skills Ontario in Toronto in early May as part of Team Sudbury.







Union of Ontario Indians Accepts SAFN Withdrawal



The Union of Ontario Indians has received notice that the Sagamok-Anishnawbek First Nation will no longer be a part of their organization.

In a release, Grand Council Chief Glen Hare says the withdrawal will be formalized at the Annual General Meeting

in June.

Sagamok chief and council decided to withdraw from the union stating it did not need a 'middleman' to deal with financial or governance matters since those rights are part of the Robinson-Huron Treaty of 1850.

Hare adds the union did receive funding to negotiate agreements, but it will be up to Sagamok to arrange funding directly.

Hare adds the two will remain friends, work together and the union will assist if called upon.



Recipe

I'm always on the lookout for a new recipe thats quick and easy to take in my lunches. ■ Being a huge fan of peanut I sauces, when I came across this recipe online - I just had



to try it! It's a delicious take on a chicken salad wrap that's crunchy and full of flavour. I loved it and just had to share:

Asian Chicken Wraps **INGREDIENTS:** For The Chicken Wraps:

- 3 cups coleslaw mix

- 1 cup shredded carrots
- - 1/3 cup roasted peanuts
- - 1/4 cup chopped fresh cilantro
- 2 cooked chicken breasts, chopped or sliced
- 6 large tortillas


For The Peanut Sauce:

- 1/4 cup honey
- 1/4 cup olive oil (or vegetable oil)
- 1/4 cup peanut butter
- 3 tbsp unseasoned rice vinegar
- 1 tbsp soy sauce
- 1 tsp sesame oil
- 1/2 tsp pepper
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1/4 1/2 tsp crushed red pepper flakes
- 1 tbsp grated fresh ginger
- 1 large garlic clove, minced

INSTRUCTIONS:

In a medium bowl, whisk together the peanut sauce ingredients. In another bowl, add the cabbage, carrots, cilantro, and peanuts. Pour the sauce over the mixture and stir. Let this sit while you prepare the tortillas and chicken. Heat up the tortillas for about 10 seconds in the microwave to make them easier to work with. Divide the chicken and coleslaw between each tortilla. Roll tightly, securing with toothpicks if necessary.

Spring is just around the corner

(thank goodness!) and there is no better time to set up your compost bin if you don't already have one. Composting is an excellent and earth-friendly way to deal with food waste & scraps. Below are two lists of things you can and cannot compost to help you. Cut them out and stick them on your fridge for quick reference! - Scrap paper

- Vegetable/fruit peels & scraps
- Egg shells
- Tea leaves
- Coffee grounds
- Lint
- Saw dust from untreated wood
- Autumn leaves
- Pet fur



- Meat & fish scraps
- Bones
- Dog/cat poop
- Fats/lards/oils
- Bread products
- Dairy products

Once the contents of your compost bin has decomposed, add the dark crumbly soil to your gardens & potted plants for a rich nitrogen boost. Happy gardening!
