

With the economy's hands tied behind its liquor. Wei Wei and his wife have been back, entrepreneurs are entrepreneuring like never before. There's already an app to track the COVID-19 virus with an app to test it on the way. There are kits to grow green vegetables at home; remotecare telemedicine has taken a great leap forward.

'Work at home' business models are boosting productivity while driving down costs. In need of a social service from an exhausted government agency? No problem – call Aunt Bertha, a networking start-up company that can lead you through the bureaucratic maze.

Companies that used to make gin have switched their production lines to producing hand sanitizers... something I disagree with very strongly.

Then there are the real hard-core entrepreneurs, those who dare to go where no starter-upper has ever gone before.

Spotting a terrific business opportunity when casinos closed down, Wei Wei and his wife Xiang Yue Chen simply started their own. They converted their lavish \$9-million stone mansion in Markham. Ontario into an extravagant gaming club complete with mah-jong tables, baccarat and slot machines. Their croupiers wore tuxedos.

Ignoring the casino's "By Invitation Only" policy, 92 York Regional Police officers raided the 20,000-square-foot fortress and confiscated eleven firearms, \$1 million in cash and \$1.5 million in

While many restaurants have thrived by delivering dinners from on-line orders, Germany's pro tennis player Laura Siegemund ordered her meal 'on-court!' In the middle of her match against Spain's Paula Badosa, she forked down a plate of

The Food for Families Program was introduced for the first time in Espanola this Spring, but vandals destroyed the final crop.



A missing Sudbury woman with strong ties to Espanola would be 23 this month.

Greater Sudbury Police Constable Kaitlyn Dunn says the police agency is seeking new information about Meagan Pilon.

She says September marked seven years that Meagan has been missing adding she was 15 years old when she disappeared and this month would have been her 23rd birthday.

Dunn says Meagan was last seen by her father, Marc Pilon, on September 11, 2013 in the New Sudbury area.

Pilon and her family have close ties to Espanola and the initial searches involved the Espanola and Manitoulin Island area.

Dunn says the investigation has been active over the past seven years and police remain committed to finding answers in relation to her disappearance.

Dunn says they have released an age-enhanced composite of Meagan and are urging individuals to come forward with any new information, no matter how small or irrelevant they feel it may be.

Meagan is described as 5'10" tall, around 140 lbs., with dark hair and hazel eyes. Meagan has a small scar on her right upper lip area.

We enlisted the assistance of a Forensic Artist with the Ontario Provincial Police and we are releasing an age-enhanced composite of what Meagan may look like today at the age of 23. - 3. Preserve what's in season by freezing, drying, canning, or pickling fresh foods! Grew more cucumbers than you can eat? Pickle them! Blueberries growing in your backyard? Freeze them for future muffins and smoothies.
- 4. Grow your own herbs at home to avoid buying plastic packaged ones that tend to spoil before you use them all.
- 4. Compost food scraps to avoid sending them to the landfill and to create a nutrient rich soil for your gardens.

I'll admit I was skeptical. I've been making the same meatloaf recipes for years, but the reviews on this recipe were great and I was looking for something easy to make for supper. I'm here



to tell you, I was pleasantly surprised. The seasoning in the dressing mix adds a delicious flavour and the breadcrumbs add just the right amount of moisture. This recipe is definitely a keeper.

#### **Stove Top Meatloaf**

- 1 box of Stove Top Stuffing (any flavour)
- 1 pound of ground beef
- 2 eggs
- ½ cup of ketchup, or more according to your taste. divided
- ½ cup of water OR ¼ cup milk and ¼ cup water (which I prefer)

Preheat oven to 350 degrees and grease a medium casserole dish or a loaf pan. In a bowl, mix together the stuffing mix, ground beef, eggs, ¼ cup of ketchup (save the rest to brush on the top) and water. Shape mixture into a loaf. Spread loaf with remaining ketchup. You can also use barbecue sauce or a mixture of both. Bake for 45-60 minutes depending on your oven. Remove from oven. Drain off the fat. Let sit for a couple minutes, slice and serve.
