## A Study Released On Swing Bridge, Consultations Continue



*By Rosalind Russell* - The various steps in replacing the Swing Bridge are expected to take anywhere between five to ten more years to complete due to ongoing consultations, studies, and more.

Last week, Stantec's regional business leader for transportation Gregg Cooke told Northeastern Manitoulin and the Islands council the next step in replacing the Swing Bridge in Little Current will be to complete an environmental assessment study, then get environmental clearance followed by the Ministry of Transportation laying out a schedule.

He says since 2018, Stantec completed the preliminary design and environmental assessment since commissioned by the Ministry of Transportation with the results now available for public review and comment. He adds maintenance continues to extend its service life as long as possible.

The bridge design has been approved bearing a similar design to the present one, but with double lanes in place to be located a little further west than the present bridge.

Cooke adds the company is now completing and posting the Transportation Environmental Study Report by summer.

## Recipe

If you're like me, you have roasted a chicken one hundred times, and think why do I need a recipe for roast chicken? I thought the same when I saw

this recipe, but I always like to try new methods and see if it's better than my usual. This recipe came through. The steps are not complicated but it did result in a juicy, delicious chicken. Cooking time will vary with different ovens and the size of your chicken, so test the temperature before removing from oven.

#### **Juicy Roast Chicken**

- (3 pound) whole chicken, giblets removed
- salt and black pepper to taste
- 1-2 tablespoon onion powder
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup margarine, divided
- 1-2 stalks of celery, leaves removed



Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Place chicken in a roasting pan, and season generously inside and out with salt and pepper. Sprinkle inside and out with onion powder. Place 3 tablespoons margarine in the chicken cavity. Arrange dollops of the remaining margarine around the chicken's exterior. Cut the celery into 3 or 4 pieces, and place in the chicken cavity. Bake uncovered 1 hour and 15 minutes in the preheated oven, to a minimum internal temperature of 180 degrees F (82 degrees C). Remove from oven and baste with melted margarine and drippings. Cover with aluminum foil and allow to rest about 30 minutes before serving.

## **Oh, The Lies We Tell... Are Spreading Like A Virus?**

Later, as a man made wealthy by owning, leasing and managing 317 slaves, Washington was rumoured to smile through a set of wooden teeth. In fact he extracted the teeth from slaves to fashion various sets of dentures for himself. So when asked about freedom for his human chattel he said: "I do not think they would be benefitted by that, thereby lying through another man's teeth. The recent history of lies reveals some real doozies.

"In today's regulatory environment, it's virtually impossible to violate the rules." After bilking 11,800 clients out of \$18 billion and now serving a 150-year prison sentence, even Bernie Madoff believes he may've misspoke.

"There's no doubt that Saddam Hussein now has weapons of mass destruction." He didn't. After eight years of a war that killed 4,550 American soldiers and 266,427 Iraqi civilians, former Vice-President Dick Chaney still can't fess up to that lie.

"Cigarette smoking is no more addictive than coffee, tea or Twinkies." With half a million Americans still dying every year from smoking, the tobacco industry giants — "Not a cough in a carload" — have now paid out over \$200 billion in medical settlements.

General Paul von Hindenburg's big lie that Germany got stabbed in the back and did not lose WWI was swallowed whole by a battered and angry populace. Hitler rode

cost the lives of 20 million soldiers, 40 million civilians and the genocide of six million Jews.

Right now tens of millions of Americans believe Trump's big lie that a perfectly legitimate and entirely honest election was 'stolen' from them. This lie sent thousands of his cult followers to storm the Capitol on January 6th and may yet lead to a civil war. In their last national war, the oxymoronically named Civil War, 650,000 Americans died.

I was thinking about lies the other day when I was being interviewed by my doctor?

"Prescription drugs?" None.

"Alcohol?" Ah, well, a couple of glasses of wine with dinner.

But our contestant still goes home with some cash, a Hamilton Beach toaster oven and the two-day New Year's Eve party package in Winnipeg."

It's estimated that about 40% of people lie about how much they drink. In Britain where 75% of people drink well above the recommended daily alcohol limit, it's way worse. The University College of London compared alcohol sales to confessed consumption and found a gap you could drive a beer truck through!

I once knew a guy, a great guy and a tough athlete who had no problem with the truth when it came to his own bad habits.

Asked by his doctor about alcohol consumption, it went like this...

"Ah, couple of beers at lunch."

Doctor makes a "good" check mark on his form.

"Then once we finish eighteen, a few more in the clubhouse."

Doctor erases "good" check mark.

"Once I get home, I'll make myself a nice big Manhattan... maybe two."

Doctor makes several "bad" check marks on his chart.

"Then the wife and I will share a bottle of wine with dinner."

Doctor snaps pen in half on clipboard and asks, pleadingly: "Is that all?!?"

## Schools And The Stay-At-Home Order

Despite the new stay-at-home order, schools across the province will remain open, unless local health officials order them closed.

While most schools remain open in the Algoma District, with the exception of two in the Sault Ste. Marie area, the Sudbury and Manitoulin Districts schools will remain closed until at least after the April Break, which begins next Monday.

Education Minister Stephen Lecce says there will be stricter safety protocols in place when students return from the spring break.

Included will be a push to encourage outdoor learning when the weather is nice, a move Lecce says helped them keep schools safe last fall.

However, Ontario's teachers unions are still calling for a shift to on-line learning until this latest wave of COVID-19 passes.

They also want to see teachers and school staff immunized as soon as possible.

## Ontario Announces Stay At Home Order And Public Health Sudbury & Districts Enhances COVID-19 Outbreak Reporting Practices

The Government of Ontario announced a Stay at Home Order for the province that took effect Thursday, April 8, at 12:01 a.m. At this time, Public Health Sudbury & Districts is expanding public disclosure of local COVID-19 outbreaks to provide more information on the local context and to help reinforce the importance of following public health measures.

"The situation locally is very serious, and I am supportive of the stronger measures being put into place by the province," said Dr. Penny Sutcliffe, Medical Officer of Health with Public Health Sudbury & Districts. "Almost 55% of recent cases have screened positive for variants of concern (VOCs), and we are seeing the virus spread in many locations including workplaces, daycares, and social settings. Under the current restrictions, it is illegal to gather indoors with people not from your household. I cannot stress how important it is to follow public health measures to buy ourselves time as we continue to work to get vaccine into arms," added Dr. Sutcliffe. Under the new restrictions announced by the province today, non-essential retail stores must also close except for

curbside pickup. Grocery stores and pharmacies are permitted to stay open for customers to shop indoors and big box retail stores are restricted to selling only essential items for in-person shopping.

То help the community where outbreaks understand are occurring, Public Health has immediately begun to post information about all outbreaks on its website, when there are no personal privacy concerns related to the situation. With this expanded disclosure of COVID-19 outbreaks, Public Health will begin posting details of outbreaks in settings like workplaces, post-secondary institutions, and licensed child care centres. This information is in addition to the details already posted related to outbreaks in schools and institutional settings, such as long-term care homes, retirement homes, hospitals,

and congregate living settings. The new table can be found at phsd.ca/COVID-19/data. The information on this page will be updated as outbreaks are declared or declared over. Public Health staff will continue to work closely with all settings experiencing outbreaks as well as affected individuals to ensure that all protocols and enhanced public health measures are in place.

Public Health will continue to issue wider public notifications in situation that involve a risk to the public due to an exposure risk or when people need to take specific actions to protect their health. Individual public notices will not be issued for outbreaks when a risk is not identified for the general community; however, the outbreak details will be posted online.

On April 1, the Government of Ontario announced a Provincewide Shutdown to help slow the increase in COVID-19 cases. Public Health Sudbury & Districts' service area, including Greater Sudbury and the districts of Sudbury and Manitoulin remains in a temporary shutdown in addition to the new Stay at Home Order announced today. Stay COVID-safe

Continue to follow public health measures. Stay home except for essential purposes such as going to the grocery store or pharmacy, accessing health care service, or for essential work. Monitor and screen for symptoms of COVID-19, get tested for COVID-19 if you have any symptoms, and practise physical distancing. You are encouraged to be physically active and take advantage of the outdoors while following public heath guidance related to physical distancing and wearing masks, when appropriate.
