

Recipe

I made these last year and they were my favourite cookie on the tray. A cutout cookie with a touch of nutmeg flavour and cakelike softness. You may



be tempted to replace the shortening with butter, but the shortening helps them remain soft and more tender. You can leave them plain or frost them with a buttercream frosting.

Old Fashion Sour Cream Cut-Out Cookies

- 1/2 cup butter flavoured shortening
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 1 large egg
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 2 2/3 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/2 cup sour cream
- Your favourite buttercream icing for frosting them

In a large bowl beat the shortening and sugar until smooth. Blend in the egg and vanilla. In a separate bowl, mix the dry ingredients. Blend the dry ingredients into the eggs alternately with the sour cream, being sure not to overwork the dough. IMPORTANT: Refrigerate the dough covered with cling wrap overnight, or at least a couple of hours. Preheat your oven to 350°F. Place half of the dough on floured surface. Press the dough out with your floured hands. Use a flour coated rolling pin to roll the dough out evenly to about 1/8 inch thickness. Coat your cookie cutters with flour and cut out as many shapes as you can. Using a flour coated spatula, carefully transfer the cookies to parchment lined or non-stick baking sheets. Repeat steps 2 & 3 with the other half of dough. Bake the cookies for I 10 to 12 minutes at 350°F or until just very slightly golden brown on the edges. Keep a close eye on the cookies, because you want them a beautiful light colour for the best texture. Allow the cookies to completely cool on cooling racks before frosting. Store in an air-tight container



An Espanola store is moving to a larger location to make room for reducing plastics through a unique initiative. Tricia Cox of Simplicity Natural Foods says the health food store is moving out of the Espanola mall to Espanola's downtown core to allow for the expansion of a refillery.

She says a refillery is a retail store designed to help reduce single use plastic consumption in everyday life by offering the option to reuse and refill your own containers again and again with household items such as foods and cleaning supplies and personal care items such as shampoo and conditioner.

Cox says people who purchase products from the store will be able to reduce their waste by bringing back their containers to refill with products used on a regular basis.

For her activism, Peltier was nominated for the International Children's Peace Prize in 2017, 2018 and 2019. Earlier this month she was also awarded the Foundation Prince Albert II de Monaco Planetary Health for Water Prize 2021, the youngest Laureate to receive the honour.
