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Our Parliament Is Now In Session — Let The Trash Talking And Back Biting Begin!

Parliament took their seats in the House of Commons last week with the Usher of the Black Rod banging on the chamber's door three times with his trademark ebony staff. This simple 671-year-old ceremony served to notify the 338 newly-elected MPs that their attendance was immediately required in the Senate Chamber to witness the Speech From The Throne.

The Usher, the Queen's messenger, had to rap really hard on the door in order to wake up the Senators who are really old, mostly white, fairly rich and prone to nodding off at the drop of a gavel.

Nairn & Hyman Township Mayor Resigns Over Covid Vaccination Policy

Nairn & Hyman Township will be looking at options in filling a vacancy left by the resignation of their mayor.

Mayor Laurier Falldien, who has filled the position for the last 11 years, submitted his resignation this last Monday over his concerns about COVID19 and the vaccination policies.

In his letter to council, he states he has been overwhelmed by stress having to close his business for seven months due to the shutdowns.

He says the second important reason is that it looks like council

will mandate vaccinations for municipal staff, a position he vehemently opposes.

He wishes his fellow councillors well and thanks the people of the community for their support over the last 11 years.

Council will declare the position vacant at its next meeting and then will discuss options to fill it

Options include holding a byelection, naming a member of the council as acting mayor, or advertising to fill the position.

The next meeting is slated for December 13th.

Recipe

My friend and I decided to adjust the original recipe for Rangoon Dip by adding shrimp and cheddar cheese to it and we think it turned



out delicious; a hot, cheesy dip that you would order off a menu at a popular restaurant. It's perfect for upcoming holiday parties or family gatherings. This makes a large dip that can be halved easily for a smaller group.

Crab and Shrimp Rangoon Dip

- 4 green onions, chopped
- 2 (8 ounce) packages cream cheese
- 1 package of imitation crab
- 1 can of cocktail shrimp, drained
- 1 1/2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce
- 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice
- 1/2 cup sour cream
- 1 1/2 cups of shredded cheddar cheese, divided

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Soften the cream cheese in the microwave for about thirty seconds. Add all the other ingredients including ½ cup of cheddar cheese and mix well. Pour dip into an oven-safe casserole dish that you have sprayed with non-stick cooking spray. Top with remaining cheddar cheese. Bake for 30 mins at 350 degrees, or until dip is hot and bubbly. Serve the dip with nacho chips, crackers or pita triangles.

FONOM Announces Resource Sharing With Municipalities

The Federation of Northern Ontario Municipalities welcomed the announcement yesterday that the province has agreed to share resource extraction revenues with Northern Ontario municipalities.

FONOM President Danny Whalen says the new revenue-sharing arrangement will see funds dispersed to municipalities to help offset costs of repairs and maintenance of local infrastructure impacted by resource operations.

Whalen says FONOM lobbied for the change and the news is welcome since it will help communities address their impacted road networks,

FONOM is an association of some 110 districts and municipalities in Northeastern Ontario mandated to work for the betterment of municipal government across the North.

For its own challenges, it had to change locations a few times, especially following the fire in the downtown, which literally destroyed their offices, but they recovered and have been a mainstay of Highway Six since then. When it first opened its doors, it did so in an auspicious year, in July of 1996, sprinter Donovan Bailey established a new world record and earned himself a gold medal at the Summer Olympics in Atlanta. The victory set off an outburst of national pride in winning the glamour event of the Olympic Games.

In 1999, the new Arctic territory

of Nunavut was created, and we dealt with Y2K. For anyone who does not know what that is, that was the wildly spread misconception, which caused many businesses to expend funds to update their computer equipment, that the Internet and computer systems would crash because supposedly the systems were all geared for the 1900s in their dating. It didn't happen and we all know how the Internet has expanded over the years.

Around&About is a part of that computerized system from keeping tabs on its finances to writing the stories, to laying out the publication every week, all done, that's right, on computer. Closer to home, our brand-new Espanola Regional Recreation Complex opened its doors in 1999 to much ado. Providing a hub for recreational, social, and interactive programs, it continues to be a center drawing in people from throughout the surrounding area.

Enter the 2000s and boy, time sure has gone by fast, so very fast. Locally, the mill changed hands from E.B. Eddy to Domtar and now has new owners for the paper giant, Paper Excellence.

We have seen the growth of the Espanola Hospital renaming itself the Espanola Regional Hospital and Health Centre. It is considered the hub of health care on the North Shore and the expansion also included the Espanola Family Health Team as well as a contingent of locums (visiting physicians specializing in different branches of medicine).

In July of 2005, Canada led the world in recognizing same-sex

marriages and in 2008, the Truth and Reconciliation process began. Follow that up with the last Canadian penny minted on May 4th, 2012. Do you still have some? In 2018, cannabis was legalized. Canada is the second country (after Uruguay in 2013) to legalize recreational cannabis use nationwide.

And in 2020, our world, the entire world changed. The first presumptive case of COVID-19 is identified; a man who travelled in China on January 25th

We also saw the opening of a brand-new school with the building of the joint Sacred Heart and Ecole le Renaissance in Espanola this year.

While our population has fallen

somewhat over the last 25 years, Espanola continues to grow in other ways. A new splash pad is on the way, and new pickle ball courts for the sports-minded. We saw the opening of the new Black- Creek Sno-Shoe Trail, the opening of new ethnic restaurants that just adds to our culture, and the development of Boogie Mountain.

The community has come together in many ways to support those who need our help. Here, at Around&About we keep you in the know through our stories and supportive businesses. We have been truly local for the last quarter-century and look forward to the next 25 years. Thank you for all your support through the years.
