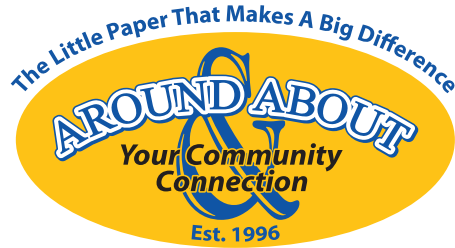

The board of the Massey Agricultural Society is going ahead with the annual Massey Fair.

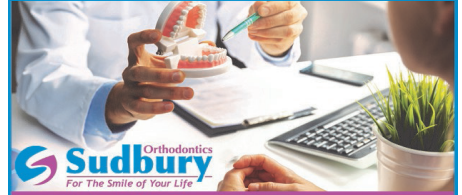

Women In Trades Program Up And Running At Espanola Campus



Cambrian College's introduction of a new program; Women in Trades, is receiving a positive response with eight students enrolled in the program.

Espanola campus training consultant Celina Mantler says the exploratory program will give women who are interested in pursuing a career in trades the opportunity to work with experienced tradespeople.

Mantler adds while the main program runs for 12 weeks starting on June 21st, the

students will also participate in an eight-week work placement.

She says mobile trades trailer labs have been set up for the participants for hands-on learning while most of the theory-based courses will be online.

NOJHL Releases Its 2021-22 Regular Season Schedule

The Northern Ontario Junior Hockey League has released its 2021-22 regular season schedule with the 336-games slated to begin on Thursday, September 16.

Of note, all scheduled dates remain tentative, pending approval of a return to play from health authorities as it relates to COVID-19.

Once the go ahead is received, each of the 12-member NOJHL clubs including Blind River, Elliot Lake and Espanola teams will play a 56-game regular season, with 27 contests apiece at home and away while their other two matchups will be held at the league's showcase, which will be held in January.

As part of the schedule, league teams will play within their own division only until the Christmas break.

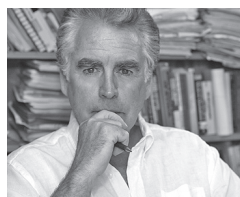

Recipe

Cilantro is one of those herbs that people either hate or love. Apparently, it all comes down to genetics on whether you taste a warm, spicy flavour or soap! I am one of those people who loves cilantro and use it whenever I can. The following recipe is great served with Mexican dishes or just as a side at any time.

Cilantro Lime Rice

- 1 cup long grain white rice
- 2 cups unsalted chicken broth
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cumin
- 2 Tablespoons fresh lime juice
- 1 teaspoon lime zest
- 2 Tablespoons chopped cilantro



Combine the rice, chicken broth, salt and ground cumin in a large saucepan or skillet. Bring to a boil over medium-high heat. Cover with lid then reduce heat to medium-low. Let simmer 20 minutes. Remove from heat, but keep lid on. Let stand with lid on for 10 minutes. Remove lid and add in lime juice, zest and chopped cilantro. Fluff with a fork and serve warm.
