Public Health Sudbury & Districts Pilot Project -**Paramedics And** The Vaccine



By Rosalind Russell - The city of Greater Sudbury and Public Health Sudbury & Districts are launching a pilot project that will see local paramedics administer the COVID-19 vaccine directly in the homes of homebound individuals.

Medical Officer of Health Dr. Penny Sutcliffe says the vaccine is available for people born in 1941 or earlier or who receive chronic home care services.

The pilot will permit access to the COVID-19 vaccine for eligible individuals who are unable to leave their homes.

She adds the pilot is not an alternative to attending a community-based mass immunization clinic, but it will help ensure access to the vaccine for those who are simply unable leave their home due to medical or physical restrictions.

Entering The Third Wave

The more-contagious coronavirus variants of concern are pushing our province into the third wave of COVID-19 infections.

The provincial science advisory table says they now make up almost half the new infections being reported each day and that proportion is rising.

Two thirds of Ontario's 34 health units are seeing reproduction rates above one, meaning each person with COVID-19 is infecting more than one other person.

For the variants of concern, that reproduction rate has jumped to 1.38.

Dairy Operation Expands In Massey Area



A major milking facility is now in operation in the Massey area. Borealis Dairy Farm is owned and operated by Keith, Dianne, and Logan Emiry, which was incorporated in June of last year. The trio built a new barn and is now milking 65 Holstein cows twice a day with the herd also including heifers and young calves. Keith says the barn

features sand-bedded stalls for the animals' comfort and a 16-cow milking parlour. The operation provides milk to local dairies throughout the Sudbury District and plans are in the works for an open house later in the year if COVID-19 restrictions are lifted. He adds the family is also looking forward to hosting 4-H club meetings on site as well.



Yard Waste Depot Moved To A New Location In Espanola



Spring is here and the Espanola council has approved the relocation of the Yard Waste Depot from near the ski hill to a new location.

Public Works Assistant Manager Dave Parker says the Yard Waste Depot began operation in 2016 as a pilot project at the snow dump across from the ski hill and allowed for the disposal of compost materials such as leaves, grass clippings, wood chips as well as brush and small pieces of wood at no charge to the public.

Prior to closing it every year, the department burns the brush, but this has resulted in complaints by area homeowners and false fire reports, so Fire Chief Mike Pichor recommended it be moved.

Council approved the relocation to the Panache Lake Road location including signage and a security camera at a cost of \$4,000.

Recipe

Sweet, salty and velvety smooth, this easy whipped feta dip with cream cheese, honey, garlic and a little kick from cracked pepper is perfect for parties, weekends or any time you want to share a



moment and bite with someone! Dip it with soft, warm pita bread or crisp, whole grain crackers. It can also be served without the honey.

Whipped Feta Dip with Honey

- 4 oz crumbled Feta cheese
- 4 oz cream cheese, room temperature
- 1 Tbsp olive oil
- 1/2 tsp minced garlic
- 1/2 tsp dried basil
- 1/4 Cup honey
- 1 Tbsp chopped pistachios or almonds
- 1 tsp finely chopped chives
- 1/2 tsp cracked black pepper

In a food processor, combine feta, cream cheese and olive oil until well combined and smooth. Add basil and garlic, mixing well again. Scoop cheese out of the food processor onto a small plate or into a shallow bowl. Use a large spoon to create a well in the center of the cheese. Fill the well with honey. Garnish the sides of the well with chives, pistachios and black pepper. Serve with warm pieces of pita bread or crackers.


