By Rosalind Russell - A partnership between the Island hospitals, Espanola Regional Hospital and local services board will assist with transportation needs.

DSAB CAO Fern Dominelli says the Ontario government has approved annual base funding up to \$300,000 for the Patient Transfer Service to support non-ambulance transportation for medically stable patients.

He says the partnership began as a pilot project in March 2013 and last year, the partners signed a three-year agreement, which will provide a PSW and attendant in each vehicle.

Dominelli adds the service will use decommissioned ambulances to provide the service.

He says it is great news for patients who need to travel to Sudbury for diagnostic testing.



New Area Code

People moving to our market area may not be getting a 7-0-5 area code. Businesses and residents requesting a new phone number in mid-June may be given a number beginning with 6-8-3. It's because there is a high demand for new telephone numbers and the introduction of the new area code will create millions of new digits to dial.

They will only be assigned when there is no longer a sufficient supply of numbers with the existing area codes. But even if you do get the 6-8-3 digits it will not mean long-distance charges to call your neighbour and will not affect 9-1-1 services. The other code used for the area served by 7-0-5 is 2-4-9 which was introduced in 2011.

Break In Hydro Rates Coming Up

The provincial government will provide a break in hydro rates due to COVID-19.

The Ford government will provide electricity-rate relief to support small businesses, as well as workers and families spending more time at home while the province is in Modified Step Two.

Energy minister Todd Smith says as of midnight, January 18th, electricity prices were set at the current off-peak rate of 8.2 cents per kilowatt-hour

all day for 21 days.

He adds the rate will apply automatically to residential, small businesses and farms who pay regulated rates set by the Ontario Energy Board and get a bill from a utility company.

Smith says adding the off-peak rate will provide immediate savings for families, small businesses and farms as all Ontarians work together to slow the spread of the Omicron variant.
